Vermont

Several activities are planned in Vermont, and it is always exciting to look ahead.

Vermont Directors Roundtable: The Directors Roundtable will be held Jan. 31, 2004 in West Lebanon, NH. Averill Tinker will host the event and Karen James and Jerilyn Bergdahl will direct Spring Ring 2004 repertoire. Directors will have a chance to share successes, discuss future events and make suggestions.

Spring Ring 2004: Plans continue to go forward for the 2004 Spring Ring to be held April 23 and 24 in Manchester, VT with Michael Helman as the clinician. The registration deadline is not until the end of January, but registrations are starting to come in. A second planning meeting was held Nov.9, 2003 in Rutland, VT, a more central location for committee members. Status reports from the committee members were presented and another meeting date was set for a final site visit in Manchester.

Spring Ring 2005: Deborah Rice was contacted and has agreed to be the clinician for Spring Ring 2005 to be held in Newport, VT.

Vermont Youth Ring 2004: The committee met Nov. 16, 2003 in West Lebanon, NH to finish planning Vermont Youth Ring 2004 to be held April 3 at Dothan Brook School, Hartland, VT. After discussion about possible solutions to increase attendance at the event, several changes were made in the agenda for the day. It was agreed to shorten the rehearsal time due to the very young age of some of the participants and to increase time for interaction and games among the participants in order to develop and foster new friendships around handbells. A pizza lunch will also be provided. Repertoire was chosen to meet the needs of the broad range of age and experience of the youth. The directors for the day will be: John Leonard, advanced ringers; Phil Brown, intermediate ringers; and Kathy Luzadar, beginning ringers.

Is your Membership Information Accurate?

Do you or a ringing friend of yours think that publications, newsletters and other written information are not reaching you? Some of our newsletters are being returned. In researching the possible causes, I have discovered a number of very simple mistakes in members' addresses. It would be VERY helpful if each of you would check your information on the national website to be sure it is accurate and if not, YOU can change it yourself.

The Web site is www.agehr.org. The first screen will have a place for "member's log in" in the top right hand corner. Put in your member's ID. Under it you will be asked for a password.

If you don't have a password, just press enter at this point. When the screen comes up, click on "Request Password". When the next screen comes up, just follow the very easy directions to acquire a password.

If you already have a password, write it in the Password box and press enter. A Members Only Menu will appear. The first selection is "View/Modify your AGEHR Contact Information". Click on that and your contact information will appear.

Check it carefully to be sure all information is accurate. If not, please change the incorrect information and press "Save Changes".

Thank you for your time. Both National and Area 1 will be better able to serve you if your contact information is accurate.

In Memoriam

Willard Markey, Vice President and Secretary of Malmark, Inc., Bellcraftsmen, passed away January 16. He was 93 years old. He joined the Malmark team in 1974, 5 years after it had been founded by Jake Malta. He served as vice president and secretary of Malmark from 1974 until his death. Willard traveled the country representing the company at festivals and workshops, big and small. He loved his work and took great pride in Malmark handbells and Malmark products. When he wasn't traveling, he could be found at his desk every day up to the past holidays of 2003. He

never retired.

Willard Markey lived a very full life. He was an active church member, active in civic affairs, a private pilot, a vocalist and front man for a popular orchestra in the 30's and 40's. He is survived by his wife, 2 daughters, 5 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren.

Willard Markey hired me as a consultant and company representative in 1980. I was very impressed by this man. He was knowledgeable, courteous, patient, and funny; a personable tease with a great sense of humor. He represented the company well and helped me in every way possible to get started.

Mr. Markey was a member of the Music Educators National Conference. In 1980 he was awarded an honorary life membership in the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers for his contributions to the art of handbell ringing.
