2003 Events:

Directors Roundtable - January 25, 2003: This event is held the last Saturday of January to help directors get a head start on the Vermont Spring Ring massed music. School, Smithfield, Maine. She will be using the chimes with students in grades 4 through 6. Her music classes are forty minutes long and are attended by up to twenty students per class. She is planning on using the chimes in the school's Christmas Program.

- 2. Lynne Welsh, living in Manchester Center, Vermont and teaching music at the Dorset Elementary School, Dorset, Vermont. The Dorset School has an enrollment of approximately 175 students. Lynn sees her classes once a week for up to 45 minutes. There are between 10 and 16 students in each class. Lynn writes that the Dorset school "has a warm, nurturing atmosphere and educational environment which stimulates a desire to learn and develop. ...I think a handchime program would be well received at the school as a tool for learning basic music skills as well as performance oriented skills." Attention: Bronze Choirs

Revised Bronze Requirements for FC '03

Registration materials for Festival/Conference 2003 will be sent out in January, 2003. Included in the registration materials are REVISED bronze level requirements for FC '03,which will determine placement on the bronze ringing floor and inclusion in the bronzedivision:

BRONZE LEVEL CHOIRS: Bronze Division registrants must submit a videotape of the choir being registered for the bronze division; the videotape must be submitted with the registration materials for the choir. The videotape must show the choir performing TWO pieces of bronze level music (level 4 or higher); the video tape does not have to be of Festival/Conference 2003 repertoire. The videotape may reflect a rehearsal or a performance setting. Names of all ringers in the videotape performance must be included with the videotape, as well as the title/arranger/level of the pieces being performed.

BRONZE LEVEL ORPHANS: Orphan ringers will no longer be placed in the bronze ringing division. Individuals wishing to ring in the bronze division as an orphan must register as a bronze ringer with a Festival/ Conference registered bronze choir; similarly, the orphan must meet the videotape requirements for bronze choirs (detailed above).


Ringers and directors will not be allowed to sight-read bronze repertoire.

Ringers seeking to be placed as orphans in coppers and tins level choirs will continue as in the past.

Gifts to Bradford Scholarship Fund

The Bradford Scholarship Fund provides partial scholarships for new choirs to attend Area I Festival/ Conference and new directors to attend AGEHR National Director's Seminar. The Bradford Scholarship is funded primarily by interest and dividends from the Bradford Endowment. Due to the decline in the stock market over the past two years earnings from the endowment have fallen off dramatically and the funds available for 2003 scholarships are much less than in recent years. The Bradford Scholarship committee believed that requests for scholarships would be higher than usual with the 2003 Festival/Conference in

Amherst, MA and the Director's Seminar happening in Hartford, CT this same summer. The committee took their concern to the Area-I Board meeting in September where two actions were taken to significantly address this issue.

First, the Board gratefully accepted a gift from the St. Luke Concert Handbell Choir from Gales Ferry, CT. "St. Luke applied for and received an Elizabeth Bradford Scholarship to attend our first Festival/ Conference at Roger Williams College in Rhode Island in 1997. Someone believed in us. It was the catalyst our seven year old program needed." Since 1997 the St. Luke choir has made two concert tours to England. Upon returning home from their second tour this past summer the choir decided to send some of the proceeds from the "retiring collections" (free-will offerings) they received to the Bradford Scholarship Fund as a thank-offering for the scholarship that had been awarded to them in 1997. At the September meeting the Board accepted this gift and decided to put it directly into the Scholarship Fund to be available for 2003 scholarships.

Additionally, the Area-I board voted to transfer \$1500 from the general fund to the Scholarship Fund to be "available for scholarships" in 2003. These two gifts along with earnings from the endowment bring the scholarship fund up to the same level that was available for scholarships in 2001. Five scholarships totaling \$2800 were awarded in 2001 for the Festival/ Conference in Burlington.

Report from a Bradford Scholarship Recipient

Are you a member of AGEHR who has never attended a Festival/Conference with your choir? Five years ago I was just such a person. We had a seven-year old handbell program that seemed to us to be doing well,

but we had never taken the opportunity to test the waters outside the security of our own sanctuary. We had two handbell choirs at that time and of the two, the high school age ringers were more willing to venture out into the *unknown*.

We had received the flyer for Festival/Conference 1997 to be held at Roger Williams College in Rhode Island. I then read in The Fundamental Tone that there was an opportunity for first time attendees to Festival/Conference to apply for an Elizabeth Bradford Scholarship. Were we lucky enough to get a scholarship, we could put it towards our registration for F/C. The committee did choose us as one recipient and we were on our way.

The registration materials talked about "Mini" concerts throughout the F/C where choirs could play a selection of their choice for other attendees. We thought, "Why not?". We had bright red vests and a handbell arrangement we loved. We decided it would be good experience for us.

Festival/Conference was wonderful! We met so many great people, learned so much and really enjoyed listening to all the musical presentations. In short, the whole experience was a real shot in the arm for our ringers and the whole handbell program at St. Luke.

I was extremely grateful to the Bradford Scholarship Committee and its chairperson at that time, Cynthia Hamburger for selecting us. It was definitely the catalyst for our future program. During the ensuing five years, the program at St. Luke has grown to one hand chime choir and five handbell choirs. The Concert Handbell Choir has played for numerous events locally, was the opening concert for Festival/Conference 2001 in Burlington, VT, made 2 CDs, toured England in summer 2001, and accepted an invitation to return to England for an "Encore Tour" and to participate in the Oxford Diocesan Convention in summer 2002.

Festival/Conference is a wonderful opportunity for individuals and/or entire choirs to experience a weekend of fun doing something you love. If you are attending for the first time, consider applying for an Elizabeth Bradford Scholarship.

Nothing ventured, nothing gained, and there is so much to gain!

How Do-I Decide...

Which Division to Ring In at Area I's Festival/Conference Next Summer?

So.....you received the Fundamental Tone in June and you REALIZED you could use those great pieces selected for the Festival/Conference during your ringing year...and ...you received the special August Area I mailing of all of the ringing activities for the next year and you DECIDED to request a registration packet for FC'03 ...and ...you're ready to order music for Festival/Conference....BUT - WAIT!

You're not sure what ringing division to ring in this year! You've looked at the repertoire list and found the Tins playing Level 2, Coppers playing Level 3 and Bronze playing Level 4/5 this year. The massed music ranges from L2+ to L3. You have experienced ringers and relatively new ringers, several have been to festivals before but this will be the first festival for other ringers in your choir - WHAT is a Choir Director to do?

First, remember that YOU are in the best position to assess your choir's ability to learn new music and to understand the instructions that will be given by the guest conductors once we arrive at Festival/Conference (review the enclosed Conductor's Rehearsal Notes on each piece of music). YOU also know how much "challenge" your choir needs or is ready for communication with your ringers will quickly tell you if they are interested in really working hard to get a piece that may be slightly beyond their reach, or if they are interested in working at the same level they usually work at that might require only "minimal" stretching beyond their current capabilities. (Remember: the Bronze division has specific requirements - see article on page 5.)

Second, YOU also can best assess how many of your group will likely be able to attend the Festival/Conference. Will it be the whole choir - whereby you can effectively use all of the repertoire from the Festival/Conference using all of your bells in future events at your church or school? Or will it be only a small group from your choir - whereby you might be able to select a ringing division that reflects the abilities more specifically of your small group using fewer octaves of bells, possibly challenging them with the more difficult repertoire or allowing them to really polish more comfortable material.



I think the following sums it up, as written in 1993 by Karen Leonard, current AGEHR President and past Area I Chair: "The point is that you must think and evaluate the process. Do what is best for your ringers and your situation, but also do what is best for the division and its director in the Festival/Conference atmosphere. Don't get in over your head by letting pride affect your decision, but don't sell yourself short on your ability and experience. Experience is a wonderful teacher and each Festival will equip your choir for the next situation."

Rehearsal Notes for Festival/Conference 2003 University of Massachusetts, Amherst July 26-29, 2003

Massed and Tins Selections, Timothy Waugh, Conductor

REHEARSAL PROCEDURES

In directing massed ringing at festivals, I've discovered some rehearsal suggestions for directors that assist in preparing your groups for festivals and massed ringing situations.

Often, directors fall into two groups; those that follow the instructions in the rehearsal notes explicitly (leaving us with inflexible groups that can only play the music at the exact metronome markings) or those that do not look at the notes at all!

These notes are to provide guidelines without being specific to any individual piece. These are concepts and ideas that you can apply to the music that we are ringing, as well as assisting you in preparing for other festivals and music at home.

TAKE TIME TO LOOK OVER THE SCORE

Usually, the composer gives us all the notes that we need. Each composer identifies dynamics, dynamic changes, special techniques, tempo markings, etc.

Most rehearsal notes are nothing more than reminders of things that the composer has already written in. Tempos are also subject to change depending on the acoustical environment. Nothing is cast in stone in a massed ringing event!

You, as director, should make notes in your score to remind your ringers of these locations, especially in the midst of problem or busy spots. These places often have the ringer so occupied to "get the notes" that the "music" is lost.

PRACTICE these spots, going to extremes - tempos much faster and slower than marked, forte really loud, piano really soft, EVERYTHING martellato, or malleted, or thumb damped in the sections that you're rehearsing.

IDENTIFY TRANSITIONS

The big "hot spots" of any massed ringing event are TRANSITION SPOTS. These are identified as key signature changes, time signature changes, tempo transitions, or bellchanges without key signature changes and PAGE TURNS! Usually, these come in combination, especially on the higher levels of literature.

REHEARSE all these sections, backing up 4-5 measures and going through the transitions identified, no matter what happens :-)!! Each time, identify things that the ringers did well, and the specific expectation e.g. "Let's work on the DYNAMICS now!" of the next repetition of the section.

PRACTICE BACKWARDS!

Start at the end of the composition and find an ending "section" and run that part until it is smooth. BACK UP and run another section, continuing through the section that you just completed. This gives the ringer a feeling of entering into sections that they are familiar with! Often, in the rush of preparation, the least prepared section of massed rung compositions is the end!

PLAY GAMES

During the rehearsal of the previously identified transitions, play "follow the director" and conduct [without speaking] accelerandi, rubati, dynamic changes, etc.

Encourage the ringers to evaluate their performance and repeat the "game", conducting other changes that are unpredictable. This is a technique to be used after the music is well on its way to completion. Another of the norms during massed ringing is the group [or several groups] that do not look at the director.

Work to identify "check-in" spots, that your ringers need to look up and mark them in some way that is meaningful to you [the ringer].

DISCUSS THE FORM OF THE COMPOSITION

Did you know that most of the handbell compositions are in ABA form? Publishers have discovered that we, as music consumers, like ABA!

Even if the composition isn't ABA, discover how the piece is put together. Have the ringers identify similar measures and sections. They'll be identifying strategies and techniques that they can apply and transfer to other locations in the selection - or maybe into other compositions!

They'll also become aware of the challenges and musicianship that is demanded of others in the group at "the other end of the table". This will improve their musicianship!

EVALUATE TECHNIQUE

Eventually, even the best ringers become lazy and the kinesthetic [muscle] memory forgets what it feels like to ring correctly. Stand back and watch your ringers as the piece is progressing and insist on good circles when ringing, flexible but good posture, and clean and controlled stopped techniques properly executed. Videotape the group during rehearsals and allow them to see and evaluate themselves.

Coppers Selections, Karen Buckwalter, Conductor

PROCESSIONAL - Sherman

Learn all of this. We will have a trumpet but not a brass quintet. Be particular with the dotted rhythm so it doesn't relax into a triplet figure.

- · Measure 34 and 35 ring close to the shoulder so the 16ths are clean
- · Measure 53 eyes up for the ritard
- · Measure 60 careful with the RT so we can have silence on the eighth rest
- · Measure 61 eyes up for the ritard
- · Measure 64 eyes up so the ritard can start in the middle of the 3rd beat

TOCCATA FOR A JOYOUS DAY - McKlveen (quarter note = 116-132)

It would be wonderful to ring this piece at 132 as suggested but we may need to bring it back a notch if some choirs need to ring it slower. Prepare your ringers to be flexible.

- · Measure 18-21 change mp to p for treble bells (upstems)
- Measure 26 C6 ringers should ring a bit less to let the theme come through on beats 1,2,3,4. This includes the C7 ringers in measure 28 as well
- · Measure 33-36 should be more lyrical for some contrast
- · Measure 54 change treble bells (upstems) to pp. Bring out the chime melody
- · Measure 63-65 treble bells (upstems) should be soft. Change the p to pp
- · Measure 72 & 74 mart close to the table on beat 4
- · Measure 79 & 80 bring out the theme on beats 1,2,3,4. Easy with C6 offbeats
- · Observe the crescendo marking to measure 82
- · Measure 93 mark f on beat 1 and add a crescendo 93 95
- · Measure 98 treble bells will damp after each shake

SEASONS OF THE HEART - Buckwalter

The chime part dynamic may need to be mf to bring out the melody.

- · Measure 4 & 13 treble clef (downstems) should be softer (See also measures 17, 31, 35, 58, 108, 112)
- · Measures 43-46 treble bells (upstems) should be softer (F6, Eb6, and D6)
- · Measures 62 beats 2,3 soft D5 and E5
- · Measure 85 note the meno mosso
- · Measures 27, 38, 54 and similar spots have a ritard

Bronze Selections, Karen Buckwalter, Conductor

FESTIVE PRAISES - Gramann

As you rehearse, remember that the high treble bells are not always the most important musical idea in any given measure, but due to the nature of handbells we know the treble bells certainly come through loud and clear.

- · Measures 3-4, 6-7 have accents in the middle/bass bells and need to be heard amidst the octave 16ths above
- · Measures 19-22 have a clear decrescendo
- Measures 23-30 observe the dynamic markings
- · Measures 31-38 have a treble melody
- Measures 39-43 note the crescendo* Measure 61 begins a fugal type section. In measure 63 the treble bells (downstem) must drop back dynamically
- · Measure 65 careful with the D6 bell; it's a melody bell in m64, but not on beat 1 of m65
- · Measure 69-78 add stress marks to the 1st triplet note of beat 1 and the 1st triplet note of beat 3
- Measure 87 bring out the theme beginning with C5 on beat 1
- · Measure 113 eyes up for the ritard

AFRICAN ALLELUIA - Moklebust

Pay careful attention to the tempo marking (quarter note = 84). This may seem slow to you for the opening but works out for the best later.

- · Measures 5-23 pluck bass bells as marked
- · Measure 24 beat 4 begin using mallets
- · Measure 37 mart (use mallet for C3 bell)
- · Measures 49-56 insist on clean marts
- · Measure 73 bass bells pluck as the piece winds down

NOTE: There is an excellent description by the composer, Cathy Moklebust, in the Choristers Guild magazine January, 2001 issue if you can obtain a copy.

SOLILOQUY FOR BELLS - Buckwalter

- · Slightly stress the quarter note beats and ring slightly less on the offbeats.
- · Measures 10-11 add a slight crescendo followed by a diminuendo in m12 (treble bells upstems)
- · Measures 16-19 add a slight crescendo and a diminuendo in measure 20
- · Measure 22 omit the LV so bells from measure 21 will ring through measure 22
- · Measures 21 and 22 put stress marks on beats 2,3,4 (G4, Bb4 in measure 21 and G5, Bb5 in measure 22)
- · Measures 23-40 stress the 1st and 3rd beat
- · Measure 27 notice the mp marking
- · Measure 31 add a crescendo beginning on beat 3
- The page turn going from page 3 to page 5 (an editor's decision, not mine) needs lots of rehearsal, especially when going from page 3-4 as we head to the end of the piece measures 35-76. This is always a rough spot. Don't ignore it!
- · Measure 45 add a crescendo through measure 46
- · Measures 54-62 stress the 1st and 3rd beats
- · Measures 63 & 67 eyes up for the ritard
- · Measure 68 mf
- · Memorize measure 75 for ritard and page turn back to beginning
- · Measures 72-75 stress the guarter note beats, not the offbeats
- · Measure 79 bring out Eb5 on beat 3 and Eb6 on beat 4
- Measure 82 beat 3 should have a soft C6 (melody is the A6)
- · Measures 86 to the end will be very slow! Eyes up!

FROEHLICH TANZE - Buckwalter

- · Use mallets
- · Measures 3-4 and 11-12 add a slight crescendo
- · Measure 26 observe the rests (this will be like having a RT on the 3rd 16th of beats 1, 2, 3)
- · Measures 39-40 add a slight crescendo
- · Measure 56 beat 4 add a crescendo
- · Measure 57 add ff
