Bell Notes from Nancy

I have just returned from the National Seminar in Milwaukee. It was good to have the opportunity to share time with other members of Area I and to meet old friends and make new ones from around the US and Canada. Such events are always invigorating and provide educational opportunities that can only help make our Area's vision even more exciting.

Do you know why your bell ringers come back week after week to work for you, the director? Do you think it's about your degrees and credentials; your directing skills? According to James Jordan, the keynote speaker at the seminar, it really isn't about your skills. It's about your relationship with your ringers; it's about your love and concern for them as individuals that fuels their commitment and helps them make the best music they can in return. Mr. Jordan stated that if he leads rehearsals and performances lovingly, he is continuously amazed by the wonderful music that results. From what I have seen at Area I events, and heard as I talk to you and your ringers, our directors ascribe wholeheartedly to this philosophy. If you would like to know more about Mr. Jordan's philosophy, and how it might relate to you, I urge you to read his book entitled *The Musician's Soul*, or one of his many other publications.

It was good to see Tim Waugh, back to his old ways. If you thought he was energetic before as he led many of us from "rhythms to ringing," you haven't seen anything yet; get ready for a surprise. His recovery from his kidney transplant is nothing short of a miracle.

Is that copy of accompaniment you use for your solo performance in the community legal? What legitimately constitutes a worship service, which makes you exempt from needing a performers license? Can you legally copy a page of music in order to make the page turns easier? These are questions we all need to consider frequently. If you have not reviewed Copyright Law recently, I urge you to do so. According to the AGEHR lawyer, W James Owen, if in doubt, call the publisher and obtain permission or the necessary licenses.

I am more excited than ever about our upcoming Festival/Conference '07, to be held at the University of Rhode Island. I had the privilege of watching our two directors for that event Bill Mathis and Michael Helman in action, and they are phenomenal. We are going to have so much FUN!!! *(continued on page 2)*

Notes from the Education Liaison



AGEHR, Area I, Inc. is proud to announce the 7th annual Area I, High School Ring Out. Wheeler School in Providence, RI will host the event on <u>Saturday, November 4</u>, 2006 from 9:00 am to 3:00 p.m. All Area I high school ringers and choirs are encouraged to participate in this exciting and growing event. The day will include rehearsals with an exciting guest director, lunch, a closing concert with an opportunity

for individual choirs to present solo pieces and plenty of time to get to know other ringers.

- **Date**: Saturday, November 4, 2006 -- This IS an SAT testing date. Junior and Senior ringers should be encouraged to contact their Guidance or College Placement offices immediately to arrange alternate test dates where possible.
- Location: Wheeler School, Providence, RI -- The school is located on Hope St in Providence in the midst of the Brown University campus. Specific directions will be sent in a confirmation letter or at http://www.wheelerschool.org. We guarantee it will be worth the trip. There are several motel and some "church hostel" options available in the area if you want to make an overnight of it. Contact Dan Moore at danielmoore@wheelerschool.org for specific information about overnight accommodations.
- **Cost**: \$10.00 per ringer covers building use fees, administrative costs and the clinician honorarium. The Area I board has committed to underwriting this event if necessary so we could bring Nancy Cappel to New England for our high school ringers! All ringers, including directors and chaperons who want to ring are asked to pay the registration fee. Non-ringing directors/chaperons attend free. You must provide one adult chaperon for each 6 youth ringers.

learning. Our massed rehearsal time is at a premium.

- **Bring**: Each Ringer should bring gloves and comfortable shoes. If your choir has a uniform or concert dress you are encouraged to wear it for the day or the performance. Each choir should bring bells, mallets, foam, table covers, music stands and tables if possible. A limited number of rental tables are available at \$10.00 each. Rental tables will be allocated by order of registration postmarks.
- Lunch: Some snacks and beverages will be provided during the day, but <u>lunch is not provided in the registration</u> Choirs coming for the day may wish to have each ringer bring their own bag lunch. A list of local fast food / take-out establishments will be provided for choirs that need to send someone out to pick up lunch.

- 9:30 Opening bell, announcements, stretches. (All choirs set up and prepared to ring.)
- 9:45 Rehearsal I
- 10:45 Break / snacks

- 12:00 Lunch (Each ringer / choir must provide their own lunch) / Solo Rehearsals
- 12:45 Rehearsal III
- 1:45 Dress Rehearsal
- 2:30 **Concert** Open to the public. Invite everyone you know !!
- 3:00 Pack up and depart for a safe trip home
- **Sharing**: We invite your choir to share a "solo" selection during the concert. Please fill out the appropriate information on the registration form. This must be done in advance for planning and programming. We reserve the right to limit the number of solo selections. You will be assigned ten minutes during lunch to run through your piece once in the performance area. Please be prompt and courteous to other groups.
- **Partial Choirs**: We know that school choirs may lose some ringers to SAT's and/or sporting events and that many inter-generational church choirs may not have a full compliment of high-school ringers. Please be encouraged to fill out your choir with chaperons or other adult ringers especially if you want to offer a solo selection but remember that all ringers must pay the \$10.00 registration fee.

If you are planning to ring only the massed selections then it's perfectly acceptable to attend with a partial choir of any size.

Even if you only have one or two high school aged ringers, you are encouraged to bring them so they can experience this event. We will try to set up an "orphan choir" for these individual ringers if there is enough interest. There is space on the Registration Form to indicate "acceptable assignment(s)" for ringers interested in an "orphan choir"

Where do you stand?

If you stand on two feet, let's talk! We have a year to get ourselves in shape for the endurance ringing event, Festival/Conference '07. And step one for being ready for the standing and walking is to consider our feet.

Shoes. Do your shoes fit? Is there room in the toe-box for your toes to wiggle? Remember as a kid they'd check for a thumb's width between the end of your big toe and the end of the shoe? They said it was for growth, but in fact, you still need it for your toes.

Arch support. When your foot is allowed to fall flat, your knee turns in, your hip twists in, your back muscles get pulled, all of which throws off your shoulder and head posture.

Or, if you have high arches that aren't supported, your foot muscles have to work hard all day to hold you up, and when they get tired, you get tired. Either way, you may not be able to be the happy, efficient ringer you want to be! So make sure your shoes have good support for your feet.

Protection. With set-up and take down of equipment, and handling luggage, you may consider wearing your sneakers or other shoes. Save your fashion statement sandals for meals and other social events.

Male bell ringer looking for a roommate for the 2006 Adult Ringer's Weekend. Please e-mail Brian at *hiker_biker_ringer@yahoo.com* if interested. Cushion. When we stand in one place, our feet don't get a break like they do when we walk and one foot is in the air as we step. So cushioning in our shoes, under the foot bones, is important. Carpet squares, foam squares, etc., are used by some folks at F/C. Do practice on them at home so you get used to them!

Shock absorption. When walking, the heel cup of your shoe is important for shock absorption as your foot takes on your body weight plus its momentum with each step. Rigid soles will send the force of the impact up your legs and into your back. So consider good, supportive, comfortable shoes as part of your bell equipment.

As you go to rehearsals this year, experiment to find which shoes are better for ringing for you. As you start your fall walking program, keep track of which shoes work best for you. And don't be afraid to be like me and pack 4-5 pair of shoes for the event! My feet like variety, and it helps prevent blisters, too.
