CONNECTICUT

Connecticut held its first annual (hopefully!)

Repertoire Reading session on Saturday, September 30. The event was hosted by Shari Lucas and the First Church of Christ, Congregational in Middletown, and Jean Degan was our clinician for the day. There were approximately 30 people in attendance, and attendees read through 25 pieces of music, including the Massed, Tins, and Coppers music for Festival/Conference '07 and some of the High School Ring Out music. Keep your eyes open for the date for next year's event!!

Suzanne Stottlemyer and The Stone Church Ringers of Groton hosted the **Area I Skill Building** workshop on October 14th. Led by clinicians Nancy Reynolds, Andy Wallace, Jean Degan, and Jane Nolan, a group of about 30 people worked on basic ringing skills and at the conclusion of the day played through two of the massed pieces for Festival/Conference '07, using all the skills they had learned throughout the day.

Upcoming concerts taking place in Connecticut during the next few months include:

Merrimack Valley Ringers will be performing at the Faith Lutheran Church, 1120 Silver Lane in East Hartford, on December 3 at 4:30. The reception after the concert will include recipes from all around the world and will offer those in attendance the opportunity to meet and speak with the musicians. The admission fee is one nonperishable food item for the needy and a free will offering.

Shoreline Ringers, Connecticut's newest community ensemble, will be in concert on Sunday December 10 at Colchester Federated Church, 60 South Main Street in Colchester at 4:00 p.m.

New England Ringers will be performing at Bethany Covenant Church in Berlin on Saturday, December 16, at 4:30. A free will offering will be received, and there will be a reception following the concert. The church is located at 786 Mill Street in Berlin.

Shoreline Ringers will be performing their second Holiday Concert at 7:00 p.m. on December 16 at Union Baptist Church on High Street in Mystic, CT.

Annual Superbell Concert, January 28, 2007, at the First Church of Christ, 250 Main Street in Wethersfield at 4:00 p.m. There is no admission fee, but a free will offering will be received.

Connecticut Spring Ring, April 28, 2007, at Valley Community Baptist Church in Avon, CT, and since the Area I Festival/Conference will be so close to us this year in Rhode Island, we expect a large turnout as we are planning to focus on the Festival/Conference music.

MASSACHUSETTS

This is an exciting time to be the chairperson for Massachusetts! I have been lucky to meet many ringers and directors at past events and in two community choirs, and am honored to represent them to the board. As this is the first report I have written, I will comment mostly on things that are upcoming 2006–2007.

The first plenary event for Massachusetts will be the first annual Massachusetts Spring Ring, to be held at Tewksbury Memorial High School on Saturday, March 31, 2007. Repertoire will be representative of Massed, Bronze, and Tin pieces for the upcoming Area 1 F/C. The conductors for the event will be Karen Leonard and Ed Henderson. This event was for nearly twenty years the Merrimack Valley English Handbell Festival. Since I am Choral Director in Billerica, and have a handbell program as part of the curriculum, we may seek in the future to move this event the few miles down the road to Billerica Memorial High School, beginning in 2008. It is also my hope to begin an annual fall skill-building workshop for Massachu-(continued on page 4)

setts. This is an event that Trinity Lutheran Church in Chelmsford, MA, would be willing to host, and for which I would be excited to plan classes and procure teachers, etc.

I am in conversation with Laurie Hunter of Trinity Church (UCC/Baptist) in Northborough, MA, about starting a bell program in her church. She has temporary access to a three-octave set of Schulmerich bells, but I would like to find her a set of unused bells. As there are many unused handbell sets in Massachusetts, it will be a goal of mine to find ways for them to become used. It is my hope either to mentor the musician in churches with unused sets, or to unite the bells with people like Ms. Hunter who are enthusiastic about starting a program, and will eventually look toward purchasing a new set of bells. I have made inquiries at three other churches about similar exchanges, all of which are tentatively optimistic.

Massachusetts continues to be home to three of New England's community handbell ensembles, the **Back Bay Ringers**, the **Merrimack Valley Ringers**, and the **New England Ringers** (who will open the 2007 Area 1 F/C). All three of these choirs present a varied concert season, each this December in collaboration with a local choral group: the Merrimack Valley Ringers with the Merrimack Chorus on Dec. 2, the Back Bay Ringers with the Boston Choral Ensemble on Dec. 8, 10, and 15, and the New England Ringers with the Treble Chorus of New England on Dec. 19.

These three choirs, among others, will be the featured groups at the first annual **Boston Handbell Festival**, held at Old South Church on May 15, 2007.


The Freedom Ringers from Trinity Baptist Church in Concord, NH, will be performing in Newton, MA,

Rehearsal Notes

...from Bill Mathis

In general:

- As much as possible, memorize beginnings, endings, and tempo changes
- Exaggerate dynamics
- Practice the bar before and bar after key changes
- E-mail me if you have any questions at whmathis1@aol.com

In specific:

TINS

Festive Exaltation

We'll really want to utilize the difference between *LV* and *R*. For instance, in ms. 6, C6 plays an eighth note, then an eighth rest, then another eighth note. Let's use this piece as a learning/ teaching time for clean damping.

If you're playing with 4 or 5 octaves, you can double the upstemmed notes in mm. 17-26.

Notice that means when there's a printed C6, C7 should play its octave double.

Be sure to use the martellato technique from just a few inches off the table, and play those notes at the marked dynamic level.

Fantasy on St. Anne

Two important things to "learn into" this piece:

1. Martellatos need to be right together, and if our hands and

- ears get used to hearing them that way, we'll be more likely to do it when there are LOTS of us trying to get together.
- 2. In much of this setting, the melody appears as the top note of a series of block chords. Please be sure that the melody sings out over its supporting harmony.

Tuya Es la Gloria

It would be lovely to have some

options available to us when we get together. If you have a guitarist or a flutist, and they would like to bring along their instruments, we might try out some combinations. And some gentle Latin-sounding percussion will add some good ambience, too.

If you're using chimes in mm. 27–35, be sure to note which pitches are bells and which are chimes, and figure out how they're going to get played.

MASSED

Psalm 9

The tempo is truly as marked—that means that a quarter note is at 180!

In ms. 33, accent the G5 on beat 3, so we start off the melody in a pretty obvious way.

4–5 oct. ensembles can double the bass line in mm. 32–41, *(continued on page 8)*

77–125. And the treble line mm. 93–125.

Carol of the Bells

Really exaggerate the dynamics, especially the quick *cresc.* and *dim.*

The scale passages will be all the more effective if they're damped cleanly—that is, every eighth note, convenient or otherwise! This will be every bit as true for you in December as for all of us together in June.

Fanfare Celebration

This tempo isn't as fast as you might think. I'd suggest a metronome check as an antidote to panic.

The shakes in the first few bars are just an eighth note long. Ring on beat 3.

Marts and Mart-lifts must be executed from just a few inches off the pad. And be sure they're really together on beat 4.

March Triumphale

In the section beginning at ms. 25, notice the dynamics are marked to bring out the melody.

In ms. 49–56, marts should be played *mp* rather than *mf*.

Please learn both treble options in mm. 72–78. We'll try several options when we're together. This will be a great time to listen for things that work differently in massed ringing.

In ms. 89, *molto rit.* mustn't be felt as "slow down a lot," but as "look up a lot." The ending will be most effective if it's well together.

Report of Festival/ Conference '07 Chair

Music selections were posted on the Web site and also used at Family Handbell Camp in August (thank you, Linda). Rehearsal notes have been received from Bill Mathis and requested a second time from Michael Helman. They will be included in the next Fundamental Tone.

A site visit to URI is still in our future but not yet scheduled. The final proposed budget is complete and was distributed at the September 2007 Board Meeting.

A logo has been selected (thank you, Bill Noss) and pricing obtained from one vendor for tee-shirts. A second vendor has yet to respond but has indicated interest in the job.

We have almost a full slate for the conference committee—still trying to nail down our equipment manager. Karen Leonard had indicated she would head up that task but due to other June 2007 commitments, cannot be in charge but is still willing to assist in obtaining equipment.

Thanks (again) to Linda Lamb, the registration packet will be available online in mid-January. We are also coordinating with Debra LeBrun to link it to our existing Access database, which will be used by our Dean of Education, Jane Nolan.

 pay a portion of the registration fee for
 Festival/Conference.
- A choir will be defined as a performing group of 7 or more ringers.
- Preference will be given to those choirs having at least 75% of their members planning to attend the Festival/Conference.
- Prior attendance by a director or a single member of a choir will not preclude eligibility for this scholarship.

 The choir must be a member in good standing in Area I.

You must fill out a registration form for Festival/ Conference in its entirety and pay a \$100 deposit per person prior to the Festival's early bird deadline.

Applications must be postmarked by February 15, 2007. You will be notified of our decision by March 15.

An Open Letter

It is 1972. I am told that I must go to a bell concert in a nearby town. I don't know anything about bells. I've heard of them and think they are a gimmick but everyone is so enthusiastic that I go to the concert. I am thrilled with the sound: it is gorgeous but my enthusiasm is short-lived. The ringers played with joyful abandon but without control, without dynamics, without damping. I wonder, where is the music?

The art of handbell ringing has come a long way since 1972. It's an amazing story of achievement and growth. I've enjoyed wondrous performances in my travels and marvel at the enrichment

that handbell involvement brings to the lives of ordinary people. The learning process can be wonderfully exciting. Everyone starts as a beginner, of course. but becomes more and more expert as knowledge and skill is gained with good teaching and time. There's much to learn and great reward in doing so. If there are experts in your midst, take advantage of them. At the beginning, you probably don't even know what you need to know! Go to Guild events, learn what you need to know. Attend bell festivals, they are for learning, whatever your stage.

Directors, it is not quite the same directing bell choir as a

vocal choir. Are you aware of the Mentoring Program that is available through Area I of the Guild? There is a great deal to learn and I have occasionally been surprised to find well qualified music educators and/or church musicians showing signs of not having learned much about handbells as an instrument or about the special art of handbell ringing. Gaining this knowledge will make directing bells far more enjoyable for all and enhance the quality of music the choir makes. It is time well spent to teach sight reading skills if this was not learned long ago, in school. Ringers who must circle

all their notes green or red may never get beyond ringing their green and red circles on the right count. On the other hand, musically literate ringers can feel like real musicians. There is great reward in learning what there is to learn. It's wonderful to have the technique to make the beautiful and varied sounds possible with bells, to have volume control for expressiveness, to ring with others at the level of an art form—WOW! It's an incredible experience especially if one has never been able to be part of a musical group until joining a bell choir.

Think about the following and beware, take care:

AVOID DAMAGING YOUR BELLS AND HURTING YOURSELVES! TAKE TIME TO LEARN HOW YOUR BELLS ARE MANUFAC-TURED AND ASSEMBLED. KNOW THE LIMITATIONS OF YOUR BELLS!

All bells are not the same. Learn the differences and what to

expect from the different makes of bells. Of our three major bells. Whitechapel, Schulmerich and Malmark, the first rings the hardest; the latter rings the easiest with the brightest sound. I have rung all three types but know the most about Malmark so the suggestions below are based upon the characteristics of that bell. Because Malmark bells tend to ring the easiest of all three popular bells, ring with ease for the best sound. Ring as hard as you do other bells and you will overring and make an unpleasant, harsh sound.

Look inside your bells, notice different style clappers. The bigger the bell, the bigger the clapper head. As the bells get smaller, so do the clapper heads. Also, the surface of the clapper heads is soft on large bells and harder as the bells become smaller. This is true for mallets, too, and why we have different mallets for different ranges of bells. Ring a solo using the same hard mallet for all three octaves of bells and you risk cracking the casting. You

also risk cracking a casting if you start a martellato motion over your head for dramatic effect and slam the bell down hard into the foam. Do a martellato by bringing the lip of the bell into the foam rather than the complete casting and you can actually break apart a Malmark bell. When polishing your bells always support the bell on the foam. Do not hold the bell in the air and rub around the casting as you chat with your friends! This can loosen the mechanical workings of the bell. Learn to do bell strokes and techniques properly: have a copy of the notation booklet published by the Guild available to use as a reference. There's no need to guess, experts have worked out the proper and safest methods of performing techniques and explanations are clear.

Taking the time to learn more about the handbell instrument, availing yourself of resources and educational opportunities, and learning about the unique characteristics of your particular set of bells will enhance your ability to make beautiful music and experience the versatility of this art form. If you are a director, helping your ringers learn how to read music with greater proficiency will increase their comfort level and help them to experience the joy of being true musicians.

Where do you stand? Part 2 Posture.

No, I'm not asking about politics. I'm talking about your feet again. When you ring, do you stand "at attention," with your feet together? Have you noticed that you need to move your feet to turn pages or make bell changes? Why risk losing your balance in the process?

Standing "at ease" is important for bell ringers. Your feet should be at least a shoulder's width apart, so that you can shift side to side for your sharps and flats. If you've taken a bell weaving course, you've heard that it's ideal to keep your bell, hand and hip in line with the space where you table damp. If you twist to reach a bell, you might ding it on another bell, and you run the risk of twisting your back.

As we ring, we also lean forward, especially for page turns, and for reaching chimes. The bigger the bells, the more forward and back weight-shifting is needed. If your feet are parallel under you, your back is doing all the leaning and reaching. The solution is to step one foot forward of the other by about a half to whole foot length. Lately I have tried starting with my foot forward on the side of the first bell I ring, just to give them equal opportunity to be the "best foot forward."



When you are well balanced on your feet, everything above should line up nicely. Hips are centered over your feet, and shoulders are above your hips. What about your head and neck posture? Can you see your music if you are standing up nice and tall? Lighting,

glasses, distance to the music, and line of sight to the director are variables to consider if your neck gets tired when you ring. Rather than my fancy noline bifocals that require too much chin-up posturing to focus, I find the fixed-distance reading glasses from the drug store work better.

Do your shoulders get tired? Do you bring the bell to your shoulder to damp, or your shoulder to the bell? If you tend to be round shouldered, work to keep your flexibility stretching back. Your shoulders and arms will also fatigue, and be at risk for aches and pains, if your elbows get away from you. This is true for elbows going too far forward and for "winging" out to the side.

The rewards for good ringing postures are energy efficiency and injury prevention. You'll be rewarded with more energy to enjoy the music!


