Bradford Scholarship Deadline Extended to April 15th DIRECTOR'S SCHOLARSHIP '08

The Bradford Scholarship was developed as a way to honor Elizabeth Bradford and her dedication to education and handbells. During non-Festival/ Conference years, as presently constructed, the Scholarship Fund makes partial scholarships available to Directors attending their first National AGEHR educational event. At the Area I Board meeting on January 12th, it was voted to extend that deadline from Feb. 15th to April 15th, since the early bird deadline for the most well-known educational event for directors, the National Seminar, is June 15th. The later date will still allow applicants to be informed of the decision of the Scholarship Committee prior to that early bird date. **CRITERIA:** All directors attending their first National AGEHR educational event, who are members of Area I, are eligible for this partial scholarship.

Have you just begun directing handbells? Do you want some specific training in directing this instrument? Have you been directing for awhile and feel a desire to reach beyond the mentoring and educational opportunities available in Area I by attending a National event? Have you wanted to meet and work with the composers and directors you have been hearing about, and whose music you have been directing? Are you interested in hearing solo (continued on page 4)

RECRUIT, RETAIN, AND REFRESH YOUR RINGERS

Excerpts from Area VII's Clapper Chatter *newsletter, November* 2007; Alanna Teragawa, Area VII Chair, author.

At the two summer Area VII Director's Seminars last year, a roundtable discussion was held about the three "R's" that face directors each year: *Recruit, Retain, Refresh.* At one time or another, we all face challenges in at least one, if not all, of these areas of caring for our ringers. Below is some of the feedback that was received.

RECRUIT:

- 1. Ask choir members to assist in the recruiting. Personal prodding from a familiar face goes a long way.
- 2. Invite prospective ringers to your bell parties.
- 3. Perform frequently, to remain visible.
- 4. Start a beginning choir if you think your current ringing skill level scares away beginners.
- Recruit through the Sunday School or VBS time by pointing to the notes during a singa-long.
- Recruit through a short temple talk during worship. Hand out bells to the congregation during the talk.

RETAIN:

1.Thank them for their weekly commitment. Show them you appreciate them!

- 2. Feed them, like 'secular' communion: artichoke dip and wine (or juice).
- 3. Make their ringing experience fun. Plan social activities.
- 4. Send handwritten thank you cards.
- 5. Keep the ringers challenged musically.
- 6. Inspire them by showing videos of professional ringing groups.
- 7. Videotape your concerts, and show it during a bell party.
- 8. Choose a variety of music: solemn to maybe funky. Even let your ringers choose some of the repertoire occasionally.

REFRESH:

- 1. Attend a massed choir festival.
- 2. Commission a piece of music for your group.
- 3. Host a choir retreat with a guest clinician.
- 4. Create a choir 'mascot,' using uniforms and a cheer.
- 5. Tour with your group, using hotels or better yet, home stays in the visited churches.
- 6. Try ensemble ringing techniques to challenge the more capable in your group.
- Attend ringing workshops in your area either as a group or encourage individuals to go with you.

— INFO — 2009 Area I Festival/Conference Divisions

The 2009 Area I Festival Conference at the University of Maine at Orono will be a tremendous event. A repertoire selection committee is at work deciding what music we will play, and the Dean of Education is hard at work deciding what, as it were, lessons we will learn. I am hard at work trying to find a few more members of my committee to assure another wildly successful FC! In each of the next several issues of the Fundamental Tone I will be writing to you about many things, and in this inaugural letter I will address the issue of the three ringing divisions for FC09.

Monica McGowan will be our massed director and will also direct the **Tins** division, the division for choirs with only a few years of ringing experience, and who have mostly two or three octaves of handbells. Typically this is the "mid-sized" division and rings three selections of music graded at AGEHR L1 and L2. The most exciting thing I can tell you about the Tins for 2009 is the institution of Tins Mastery, a series of classes for each Tins choir and their director. This new program will give each group extra time to solve issues in the massed and divisional music, and to work with a master teacher.

The **Coppers** division is by far the largest group of ringers, and will be led by the venerable composer and conductor, William Griffin. Choirs in this division typically have been ringing for several years and may have three-to-five octaves of handbells. Repertoire for this division typically includes three pieces graded at AGEHR L2–L3+. Careful scheduling at FC09 will allow all Coppers ringers to enjoy classes AND rehearsals without any conflicts!

Finally our auditioned **Bronze** division is typically our smallest ringing division. William Griffin will also lead these choirs, generally represented by groups with many years of experience, extended sets of bells and chimes, and a desire to ring "bronze-level" music, graded at AGEHR L4–L6. Based upon feedback received from ringers on the FC07 evaluation forms, and in order to continue the high level of music making in this division, I will clarify the criteria for Bronze division choirs:

- The bronze choir must submit an audio/video recording of two selections of L4–L6 music, one selection being an FC09 Bronze division piece.
 - A recording both of the sound and the images in which the choir and director are clearly visible.
 - Titles, composers/arrangers, and publisher information must accompany the submission.
 - DVD is the preferred format for this submission.
 - Ringers on the recording must be the ringers who are registered for FC09.
- The video can be of a rehearsal or a performance, but with the video equipment currently available, should be of high quality and clarity.
- The choir's recording will be reviewed by a small, impartial, anonymous committee that will evaluate the performance based on the rubric found on the following page.
- The video must be clearly labeled and submitted to the FC Chair by January 30, 2009. Further submission guidelines will follow.
- All choirs and directors will receive written feedback from the committee about the performance, including an overall score with a breakdown of each rubric category.
- Try using this rubric with your choir before you submit your audition tape.
- The "low" score is 9. The "high" score is 40.
- Each auditioning group will be judged only (continued on page 12)

against the rubric, not against other submissions.

- Each auditioning group will be considered individually, but a score of 25 or higher will be needed for acceptance to the FC09 Bronze division.
- If the reviewing committee has a concern that the choir might not be prepared to participate in the Bronze division:
 - The choir may be asked to ring in the Coppers division
 - The choir may be asked to work on suggested

issues, work with an Area I mentor, and resubmit a new recording.

The purpose of these guidelines is to ensure a positive experience for all in the Bronze division at FC09. This is a slightly different process than the one that was used at the 2007 Festival/Conference at URI, and it is the intention of the Area I board that this be a transparent, fair process. Our mission is all about POEMS! (Performing, Organizing, Educating, Mentoring, and Socializing). Come one, come all to the University of Maine at Orono for the 2009 Area I Festival/Conference to see what POEMS can do for you!

REPORT FROM RHODE ISLAND



Beginning in 2003, The Rhode Island Handbell Advisory Board (RIHAB) was formally organized to promote ringing activities in the state. Charter members were those who wanted to promote handbell ringing and have a stronger voice in the organization of ringing events. While living in a small state does have advantages, the Rhode Island leadership was at best inconsistent—during some years very active and at other times nearly invisible.

Under the leadership of Lori Kast, RIHAB moved ahead. Membership increased, financial records properly kept, and ringers in RI had activities to attend and be proud of. Except for a one-year tenure by Andy Wallace, the state chair position has remained vacant since Lori's retirement.

The first round of RI Handbell Workshops were held at various locations throughout the state (2003–04) offering two events focused on basic ringing techniques, and one event for directors, dealing with recruitment and retention of ringers, handbell assignments, teaching technique, and presentation. The premise was that the state membership would benefit from a series of varied, intense, and inexpensive workshops. Initial workshops were held on Saturday mornings for three hours with enrollment limited to 12 in each class. Registration fee was \$10.00.

During these years, under the watchful eye of State Chair Lori Kast, the Board continued to plan and implement a Spring Ring. Jean Degan was the massed conductor in 2004. As the Board assumed more and more responsibility for the organization of state activities, additional RIHAB members were recruited and tasks were assigned to implement activities and keep track of our organizational needs (financial and secretarial records).

It became clear that while each member of RIHAB was willing to pitch in, there was not one individual keen on assuming the state chairmanship. RIHAB, however, was becoming an increasingly strong force in the region. Although workshop registrations fluc-

tuated, the Board voted to persist, and expand the offerings. The Board felt that offering regular workshops as a series of events was the key to success.

The decision to again promote workshops was supported for the next few years. The 2005 Spring Ring, however, was cancelled due to low registration. Bill Alexander was to have been the clinician. That cancellation was both a fiscal and philosophical blow to the Board. That year also saw a sharp decrease in workshop registrations.

To counteract the problems of 2004–05, the Board agreed to support a new approach to the workshops, and replace the Spring Ring every other year with an invitational handbell festival concert modeled after The Perkins Festival in Boston. The invitational concert was a huge success, drawing choirs from both Massachusetts and Rhode Island. The workshops became enhanced repertoire reading sessions with the clinician(s) choosing select pieces as teaching tools to convey specific ideas. The workshops have been well-received.

The 2008 RI Spring Ring will be May 3, in East Greenwich, RI. Tim Waugh is the massed director/ clinician. Registration is limited, and all information about the event is on the Area I website.

Throughout this somewhat tumultuous period, RIHAB has been mindful of its obligations and responsibility to the Area I Board, and has made every effort to comply with policy and procedure, as well as the spirit of Area I. With the advent of more regular (we hope) representation, RIHAB looks forward to improved communication with the Area I Board and the membership.
