From that time forward POEMS was adopted into our mission as a board and informs all of the things we do, particularly in regard to event planning.

Performing Many of our events involve public performances, sharing concerts, reading sessions, and mini-concerts. Our ultimate goal and the most important one, the one all of the other lines of the POEM lead to, is bringing handbell music to as wide an audience as possible.

Organizing With such a glut of musical talent in Area I, we need to plan how we distribute that wealth! With teachers, composers, performers, event planners, and conductors at the ready, we hope to create events that fulfill the needs of our members.

Educating Not only because our founder was a special education teacher, not only because so many handbell directors, ringers, board members, and performers are also teachers, not only chimes in education are such an effective tool for developing so many competencies, and not only because we have such an effective chime loaner program, but also because everyone deserves to experience the sheer JOY of playing handbells. These are the reasons we educate.

Mentoring Have you been the lucky recipient of a mentoring session from an Area I mentor? Each state has a bevy of highly qualified handbell ringers, teachers, and directors who gladly

give of their time to new directors and ringers. Have you just purchased your first set of chimes or bells? Contact your state chairperson and ask for time with a mentor! You and your program will truly enjoy this experience.

Socializing The handbell community is spread across the globe, but is blessed with a very strong sense of community. "Bell people" do not need any help socializing, but it is very important to your board! Each event has a socializing or networking element for us to meet new colleagues, or to re-acquaint with friends we haven't seen since the last bell event! If you have been at this a while you have "festival/conference" friends. If you are new to bells, come to FCO9 and you will be issued at least ten "festival/conference" friends. They will be friends for LIFE!

Festival/Conference '09

Happy Spring! I am writing this on the first warm day of 2009. This weather reminds me how close

the summer is and how much closer we are to our next Area I Festival/ Conference at the University of Maine at Orono. So much work has already been done: repertoire has been chosen by an able committee, massed and divisional conductors have been hired, a world-class handbell ensemble has been contracted to perform our opening concert, music has been commissioned especially for this FC, classes and curriculum have been set, teachers have been invited, campuses and hotels have been visited, contracts have been

negotiated and signed, and budgets have been calculated.

On the subject of budget I must here say a few unpleasant words: Pay. More. Money.

Everything we use and buy has seen exponential growth in cost over the past two years. In addition to that, the board chose UMaine at Orono knowing that it would be a more expensive campus than was the University of Rhode Island in 2007. Food and dorms would be more costly to begin with, and many choirs would have to travel a great distance to attend the festival. One paramount consideration, however, was that the University of Maine conference/catering department was exemplary at the 1999 Festival/Conference, and after a somewhat tepid experience with their counterparts in RI, the board felt it was time to return to the outstanding facility and colossally-gifted staff at Orono.

I had an enlightening experience talking with other area leaders in April at the National AGEHR Area Advisory Council in Dallas, TX. Other area festivals have a similar price structure, or even a less expensive registration fee than does our typical Area I FC. One difference that is VERY important to consider is that WE FEED AND HOUSE OUR ATTEN-DEES. Can you imagine 800 ringers going to McDonald's for lunch? For 2009, we'll enjoy great facilities, a functional schedule, and a positive

experience with all aspects of "room and board."

Before you flip to see the per-ringer costs of the 2009 festival, please understand that many rate structures were explored and this was the LOWEST option the board could entertain in order to ensure the viability of the both event and the area. Our financial lifeblood is generated in our biennial Festival/Conference and we need you to start your fund raising engines so that we can have 800

ringers at the Alfond Arena in June of 2009.

Is your choir going to attend FCO9 as a first-time group? Apply for the Elizabeth Bradford Scholarship! In 2007 four choirs were awarded partial registration fees and we hope to have ten applicants for 2009! Information on this scholarship can be found at www.agehrarea1.org.

Start saving your pennies for Festival/Conference 2009! Make sure you register early to get the reduced rates! I can't imagine a more perfect combination than your talent, our conductors' expertise, and the beauty of summer in Vacationland!

We are very excited to announce that for FC09 we will be using a coordinated curriculum for our class offerings that has been designed by the FC09 Dean of Education, Daniel K. Moore. "DKM" has taught handbells for more than 30 years at The Wheeler School in Providence, RI, and has been chair of nearly every committee and subcommittee both locally and nationally since his involvement in handbells began. Recently retired as chair of the National AGEHR Certification committee, he has spent a year creating class descriptions, class and rehearsal schedules, and selecting faculty for our next FC.

Classes will be offered in several areas, including bell techniques, musicianship and music theory, conducting, and in the ever popular "fun" subjects (i.e., non-bell classes). What skills do you need to develop? *Handbell YOU!* will help you. Have you always wondered about a musicianship or music theory topic and haven't had the time or place to ask? *Handbell YOU!* is on the job. Does your conducting need a little TLC? Have no fear; *Handbell YOU!* is here.

Each ringing division will "break" from rehearsal and move to classes appropriate for that division's level and needs. Each ringer will be given a suggested "course of study" involving several classes to choose from in preregistration. While we still CAN-NOT guarantee 100% fulfillment of any registrant's selections, by offering the same classes MULTI-PLE times, we will come very close to that ideal. As always we will have a class-card swap board for you to "trade-in" a card for a class you might have already taken for a class that interests you. If, however, everything that "DKM" tells me is true, FCO9 will be a class "dream."

If you have any questions or concerns about any aspect of FC09, I really need to hear from you. As I said in an earlier FT article, I actually read each FC07 evaluation form (particularly those about me and my alarm clock issues). It is my job to plan and (as it were) execute FC09, but ultimately it belongs to YOU! It is my firm belief that *Handbell YOU!* will become an important part of each future AGEHR Area I Festival/Conference.

Simply listening to and watching these high level ensembles was an incredible learning experience and worth the trip.

Boston Area Handbell Choirs Come Together to Bring Music To Schools

Boston – For the second year in a row, a Boston area school is getting a special gift. The music department will receive two octaves of Malmark Choirchimes as the result of an innovative fundraiser sponsored by the Back Bay Ringers.

The Boston Handbell Festival, to be held May 20, 2008, at Boston's historic Old South Church, culminates in the presentation of the donated Malmark Choirchimes to a representative from the chosen school. The event is sponsored by the Back Bay Ringers and Old South Church, and, in addition to ensembles from those organizations, features performances by the New England Ringers, Merrimack Valley Ringers, and the Shoreline Ringers. There is no admission charge, but a freewill offering will be applied toward the cost of the chime purchase.

"We started the Boston Handbell Festival to honor Boston's long connection with handbell ringing," says Griff Gall, artistic director for the Back Bay Ringers. "It continues the tradition of the Perkins Festival, held for years in the same location. This is also a great way to showcase some of New England's most talented advanced ringing ensembles, all in one place." Concertgoers are treated to a variety of handbell music, ranging from the secular to sacred, including both original compositions and arrangements of standards from other musical genres. Each group will perform two solo pieces, and all will participate in massed ringing to begin and end the concert. Karen Leonard, director of the Merrimack Valley Ringers, is charged with the difficult task of leading the massed ringing – with only a half hour rehearsal to prepare.

"It can be a challenge to get all the groups to agree on what the tempo and interpretation of the massed pieces will be in a 30minute rehearsal before the concert, but that challenge is one of the things I really enjoy," says Leonard. "The various groups prepare the massed selections with their own directors, then have to get used to my conducting in a very short period of time. The fact that it works is a testimony to the musicality of the ringers. They are wellrehearsed when they arrive, which allows them the freedom to watch me. It is a thrilling experience to be able to make music together."

"I think the art of handbell ringing is always improved when ensembles have a chance to see one another perform," explains Peter Coulombe, director of the Old South Ringers. "You can learn so much from watching what another group does, from musicality to choreography. As a director, I can use this shared experience to point out things that were good and worth emulating, and everyone will know what I'm talking about."

The concert program is designed to be accessible to those unfamiliar with handbell music, but much care is taken to make sure handbell enthusiasts and the music-savvy Boston audience are entertained as well.

"One of the biggest reasons we sponsor this event is to introduce advanced handbell music to a much wider audience," says Patrick Gagnon, associate director of Back Bay Ringers. "This stunning venue, the history of the Perkins Festival, and the ability that five choirs have in terms of event promotion ensures the success of this performance and its most important donation of chimes. BBR is always looking for new ways to turn people on to our somewhat insular way of making music. This event is a draw for Boston's music lovers as well as our 'handbell groupies.' Our audiences have always included people who are hearing handbells and chimes for the first time."

It was that same goal that inspired the chime donation program. Serving as education liaison to AGEHR Area I and working as a music educator in a Boston suburb showed Griff Gall how elementary-aged children benefit from the opportunity to play on chimes.

"Chimes are a terrific instrument to use with children because of their versatility," says Gall. "One set of chimes can engage many students in active music-making. Teachers can create concrete hands-on learning experiences for complex musical ideas such as key signatures, scales, tonality, and accidentals with the chimes. They can also help build independence in reading and performing rhythms and maintaining a sense of steady beat."

Karen Leonard adds, chimes can spark a passion for music that stays with children their entire lives. She says she's seen those results first hand, through her program at church.

"Children I had 28 years ago have grown up, gone away to college, and are now back ringing as adults — or contributing in some other way to the musical life of the church and community. I would like to think it was their early exposure to a successful musical experience that made the difference, and got them hooked on music."

Although AGEHR Area I currently coordinates a chime loaner program to schools within the coverage area, Gall felt it was important to ensure chimes become a permanent addition to music curricula. The selected school will receive its own twooctave set of Malmark Choirchimes, as well as beginner sheet music to help with classroom use. In addition, the teacher who made the application will receive a consultation session with Gall on how to teach with chimes, and will be



invited to sit in on a Back Bay Ringers rehearsal that includes a chime demonstration. Schools from all over the Boston metro area have been invited to apply. The application deadline is April 25.

"For me, this is a way to ensure the long term relevance of our unique art," says Gagnon, who is currently Chair-Elect of Area I. "Current thinking in many school districts aligns music education with extracurricular activities rather than core curriculum. This tragedy manifests itself first in dwindling budget allocations given to classroom music teachers, then in the loss of teaching positions. Yet in the face of this negativity, here is an event where almost 100 musicians will prepare repertoire, publicize, promote, attend, and give financially so a group of children they don't even know will be able to experience the art of ringing. It doesn't get any better than that."

"That's the best part about the Boston Handbell Festival," says Coulombe, "bringing people together to accomplish something none of us could do alone."

Author Kelly Isenor has been ringing handbells off and on since she was 8 years old, and counts an annual performance with Boston's Handel and Haydn Society at Symphony Hall as one of her favorite musical opportunities. Then it was time for orders! All orders were pre-sold, to be picked up the day before the event, some fresh and some frozen. Their choir used heavy-duty Ziploc bags to package the product, but next year will use paper or plastic soup contain-

ers for packaging, after finding the Ziploc bags hard to handle. — *Editor*

Some of the fundraising ideas from other Areas: 1) give a concert and accept a freewill offering, 2) print cookbooks using choir members' favorite recipes, 3) print and sell calendars, 4) sell flowering plants and bulbs, and, of course, 5) hold bake and food sales. (And don't foget to look into Area I's Bradford Scholarship to help first-time attendees pay their way.)

I had a wonderful conversation in February at the Directors' Seminar with Mary Divers of Laconia, NH. One of our discussions concerned her Good Shepherd Lutheran Church choir's fundraising efforts. They decided that making and selling chili on Super Bowl Sunday was sure to be a hit! My local high school's Music Boosters does a similar fundraiser—pre-selling and delivering subs on Super Bowl Sunday. It's a great idea to lessen the work of inviting people over for the game, and your choir's supporters are sure to love it.

Mary's choir members decided upon the recipe after members submitted their recipes for tasting.

"As directors, we are all teachers!" **Tunes That Teach:** By Martha Lynn Thompson

Open up the book Tunes that Teach and the first page reads, "Permission to photocopy the exercises and pieces in this book is hereby granted to one teacher or director as part of the purchase price." This is just one of the many features of this new resource published for AGEHR. This resource is divided into twelve units with each unit centered on a song that has been printed in both a two octave and a three-octave version. Each unit contains a collection of exercises designed to address musical challenges in the specific song. A teacher notes page that lists learning goals, suggestions for teaching and historical and cultural context for the arrangement is also included in each unit. All of the arrangements in this book have multiple titles that allow them to be performed in a variety of settings including worship or as part of a public school music program. This book also contains a guide to Handbell Notation and a glossary of Music Terms that can be photo copied for your ringer's binders. The back of the book contains a few simple worksheets for identifying note names on the staff, and a few word searches. The words searches might be good to have in the ringer's folders to keep them out of trouble if you are working with another section during part of a rehearsal.

The ten pieces of repertoire selected for this collection provide a wonderful variety of classical tunes and folk melodies. The tunes include, English County Dance (All things Bright and Beautiful,) Austria (Glorious Things of thee are spoken,) and Trumpet Tune in C. The Native American Melody I would use with caution, as I have not been able to verify the authenticity and appropriateness of this selection. (There is much debate over the use of Native American music because melodies were often taken from the culture with out general consent for performing the melody out of context. If I did choose to perform this selection, I would not play the accented drum beat as written, instead it would be more appropriate to keep the drum beat free of accents, playing each beat evenly.) This book is not intended as a "method" for teaching ringing. The repertoire is arranged by difficulty and Thompson has carefully introduced new techniques through out the book in a logical order that provides a clear teaching path.

Thompson writes, "As you use this material, you should not only think like a handbell/handchime director, but you should also think like a teacher. As directors, we are all teachers!" Her enthusiasm for developing real musical learning, as opposed to just teaching a song for a performance is clear through out this terrific resource. I hope that we see more resources like this that provide such clear learning opportunities for both directors and ringers!

Things You (may) Need to Know About Traveling With Handbells The Wheeler School Concert Ringers' Trek to Florida

- Did you know that the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) will only open your handbell cases at the airport if you are carrying heavy metal such as C3 – F3.
- Did you know that your manufacturer's cases are not made to withstand the rigors of repeated air travel? They look nice in your closet and will last there indefinitely.
- Did you know that directing twelve sunburned teens is somewhat like trying to get penguins to ring handbells? It just isn't right!
- Did you know that an adult handbell director can go for 96 hours without sleep?



The music, you ask? What about the music? Did they play well? Were the audiences receptive? A friend who previewed the tour program* months before we left and remarked that I had lost my mind; surely no sane person would program that

> repertoire all at once, especially for high school ringers. My reply was simple: you gotta keep 'em busy or pay the consequences of boredom, feigned mental fatigue, and imaginary aches and pains. Was every note perfect? No. Was every rhythm crisply accurate? No. Are they ever? That's the handbell director's ultimate dream. What there was, however, was genuinely grand music

These are but some of the lessons learned from the Concert Handbell Ringers of the Wheeler School's recent tour to Florida. A year's planning is just barely enough. The Providence-to- Tampa non-stop flight was easy; locating rental vans in the parking garage was not quite so easy; finding our way to a rendezvous point to pick loaned pads and covers was a challenge; finding our motel in Bradenton was next to impossible. And that was only day one!

Touring with a teen handbell choir is always full of surprises—such as Bill Griffin (past AGEHR President and music editor) showing up for our first concert after a two-and-a-half hour drive (he spent most of his time helping the audience find seats!). That was a surprise and an honor! What a surprise to find that every sanctuary we played in seated a minimum of 900 people, had room for three or more handbell choirs to set up at once, and had built-in audio and video recording equipment. making, communication and interaction with the audiences, and most importantly, a growth and transformation within each ringer —a commitment to do the best job possible.

We'll get back to Florida again, someday. In the meantime we are indebted to the ringer's parents for their support, to our school for making such a trip feasible, to the concert hosts for providing excellent venues (and meals), and to the leadership of Florida's AGEHR chapter for their support.
