TINS

Ring Jubilee,

arr. Susan E. Geschke

 Remember what it says at the beginning, just below the Bells Used Chart: Joyously!

- Observe all dynamics, and rehearse all tempo changes: poco rit., rall., rit., molto rall., a tempo and Tempo I.
- Doing so will transform the ink on the page to music that touches the heart. When the music we present makes that emotional connection with our

listener's, we have achieved success. Tempi as indicated in the score.

- Prepare for the Martellato technique. Remember, the bell is already dead; it is not up to us or the ringer to kill it again. Instruct your ringers to watch closely in m. 23 there will be space between those notes for the poco rit.
- I will not conduct "beats" for the *fermata* in m. 24. The preparatory beat will clearly indicate the slower tempo in m. 25.
- The Echo Technique is suc-

cessfully executed by simply touching the lip of the casting to the table on the beats indicated. It is much like a skipping stone skimming across the water - too much force or downward angle and the stone sinks. Light touches or skips across the water keep it going. So should the echoes keep on going. The whole notes within the brackets, beginning m. 34 are the notes to be "echoed." The mart-lifts on the quarter notes should be very light and not out of character of this section.

Performance Notes

William Griffin, Conductor, Coppers and Bronze



Some general comments about these performance notes: generally, we will not point out anything written in the

music regarding dynamics, tempo, techniques, ritards, etc. We would ask that directors heed all markings unless noted otherwise in these notes. There may be some occasional reinforcement of some markings or an explanation of how it will be directed. Please note, and stress with your ringers, that acoustical conditions, preparation of groups, and general level of the ringers may change some of the tempi, dynamics, etc. It is suggested that each piece of music be worked at different tempi and dynamics so the ringers will be able to adapt to the massed ringing setting with a minimum of difficulty.

COPPERS

Bell Paean, by Derek Hakes

- Work for a tempo of 132 to the quarter; we would like to direct it in 1 rather than 3.
- Please observe footnote at bottom of pages 3 (m's 16–20) and 5 (m's 51–55)

and work on suggested doubling.

- Measures 20–35, please use mallets for the staccato notes; use *PI* if you do not have mallets. Work to keep all staccato one dynamic less than the melodic line.
- Measures 55–58 and 63–66 please keep *martellato* very light (very close to the table).
- Measure 94, add a slight and gradual accelerando to measure 98.
- Measure 98, a tempo without *molto ritard*, just a *ritard*.

 an opportunity to watch and prepare for *Tempo I* on the next page!!

Praise Unfolding, Sandra Eithun

- Dynamic contrast needs our attention in this selection. Be especially mindful of the *piano* section (trebles) in mm. 37–38.
- The shake *(SK)* technique can be played musically—shakes do not begin at stun!! After the attack of the clapper to casting, let the shake grow dynamically. We'll have a more musical result!
- Rehearse the *rit. e dim.* mm. 73–76 with the intent of watching the director through the entire conclusion of the piece. Bass bells—be sure to have your mallets at the ready long before m. 77!

Humbly, I Adore You, Shawn Gingrich

- The challenge I find with choirs transitioning from ringing handbells to ringing handchimes is to play the handchimes with greater finesse and gentleness. Even though the melodic line is marked at mf does not require the ringers to over-ring the handchimes. The sound, clarity and pure tone of the handchimes will carry through the sustain of the handbell chords without extra effort.
- Pay attention to the different types of dynamic contrast used in this piece: gradual dynamic changes, as indicated in measures like 13–15 and those of terraced dynamics where entrances change by dynamic degrees, not previous increases. Examples such as these are: mm. 1–4 are *p*; the entrance at m. 5 is *mp*.
- Be prepared for the change in meter for the last line of the composition. You will see a marked difference in my conducting pattern—watch for

beat two to go away from the body. I may conduct this closing section by simply indicating the entrances rather than conducting all the beats.

MASSED

On This Day Earth Shall Ring arr. Cathy Moklebust

- It would be best if all those playing with mallets have two mallets available per ringer. To achieve the drive and motion this piece deserves, malleting with a single mallet will be uneven and exhausting for the ringers. Don't waste your energy—share the load by using two mallets. What an opportunity to practice your sticking technique!!!
- Trebles be aware: you do not carry the primary melodic line beginning in m. 29. Please, please, please play this at the dynamic indicated in the score: p.
- Be ready for and observe the eighth note rest,
 m. 38! A very clean damp is required!
- m. 61: caution bass not too much energy and force for those off-beat marts! Yes, I know the dynamic marking is *ff* but martellato articulations carry through more powerfully than ringing.
- mm. 70–71 Trebles: please start your shake softly and add *crescendo* where it is indicated to add drama to the end of this piece!

What Wondrous Love is This

arr. Arnold B. Sherman

- Even though it will be tempting to rehearse this piece in four, please conduct it in 2.
- The challenge will be in beginning this piece soft enough and getting all the bells to "speak" when they should.
- Be diligent in the execution of the echoes in mm. 30–33 with special attention to the



change in dynamics between the repeated sequences.

- Strive to be very familiar with the passages between mm. 36–45. This will allow for greater flexibility and execution, giving the conductor the ability to truly conduct the *accel.*, *rit.*, *accel.* for greater musical interest to introduce the restatement of the melodic line which begins in m. 44, beat 2.
- Closely watch for the individual cues for the quarter notes in the last two measures of the piece. Treble bells: have your mallets at the ready long before you arrive at m. 83.

Celebration, Fred Gramann

 I was lucky enough to get to ring this piece at the 30th Celebration of the Bay View Week of Handbells in 2007. It is a great piece and it really moves.

- Learning from our rehearsals at Bay View, I would like you to add the following additional notations:
 - Bass and Battery: remove the swings in mm. 24–26.
 - Trebles: be sure to maintain your dynamic marking of *p* at m. 32. It is only the bass that ring mf. The same is true at mm. 36 and 40.
 - m. 44: trebles add the dynamic marking of p; bass add the dynamic marking *mf*.
 - m. 46: C6—add an accent to bring out the entrance of the inner melodic line.

Coventry Carol, setting by Michael Helman

- The first 8 bars are basically an introduction to the main melody. Work it in 2 bar phrases bringing out the treble melody. Add some stress to the first note of measure 2, 4, 6, and 8 – work out the hairpin *cresc./decresc.* Add *crescendi* in measures 1, 3, and 5-6; and *decrescendi* in measures 2, 4, and 7-9.
- Bring out melodic line when melody enters in measure 10, accompaniment lines should be one dynamic less than the melodic lines throughout the entire piece.
- Measures 13–14, 16–17, 21–22—please bring out the counter melody in the alto line (same melody as used in the introduction)

- Measure 17, please add a *poco ritard*, then *a tempo* in measure 18.
- Again, bring out counter melody in measures 21, 28, and 32.
- Measure 38, a very slight *ritard* to measure 39, a very slight pause before starting 39, a tempo at that point.
- Measure 71, please change the Bb 6/7 in beat 1 to a B natural.
- Measure 81, slight subdivision on the 8ths at the end of the measure.
- Watch for counter melody fragments again in this section.
- Measure 105 will be subdivided with a *ritard* and a *decrescendo*.
- Watch closely in 105 and 106 for clean ensemble (attacks).

When We All Get to Heaven

setting by Tammy Waldrop

- All as marked we will see at what tempo we can cleanly play this tune (work it to a 138 to the quarter if possible).
- Bass handbells, memorize measures 6-7 and 56–59.
- Measures 22–29, bring out the melody in the treble clef (down stemmed notes).
- The section that starts with the pick-up into 39, bring out melodic line in the bass.

BRONZE

A Walk in the Park

Karen Lakey Buckwalter

- Keep the entire piece light and relaxed.
- Please use mallets on all staccato.
- When possible please work out handbell assign-



ments, so one person plays the grace note and the note to which the grace note is "tied."

- In measures 16 and 58, the cut-off of the dotted half will be the preparatory for the third beat of the measure. In essence we will be adding a beat to the measure: the dotted half will be beats 1 and 2 with the *fermata* on 2; the 3rd beat would be the cut-off and the preparatory for the 4th beat, the 4th beat would be the D5; the fifth beat would be the G5.
- Please bring out the melodic line in the bass clef in measure 24 (the D4, G4, and Ab4).
- Measure 42, please change the *ten.* to a *ferma-ta* (it will be a short one). We will direct it in a similar manner to measures 16 and 58. When the cut-off is given for the *fermata*, please sustain the D5 into the balance of the measure.
- Measures 67 and 68, please bring out the quar-

ter and eighth notes. Keep the dotted half notes one dynamic less than the quarters and eighths.

- Measures 70–71, please work out the *sfz* to the *pp* to achieve the greatest dynamic contrast possible.
- Measure 72, observe the *fermata* on beats 1 & 2, each eighth on beat 3 will be directed.

Dance of the Reed Flutes

Tchaikovsky/Griffin

- Keep this number light throughout.
- If available please use mallets on all staccato notes.
- In measures 5, 13, 29, 37, 64, and 72; please observe the accent on beat 3.

- Measures 19–24, please use handchimes on indicated notes (with the "x").
- Measure 26, leave out the A3 on the and of 4; almost no *ritard* in this measure—do not slow up the 16ths in the bass clef, work out the handbell assignments so this can be covered smoothly; do not use mallets on any part of the bass line in this measure!
- Measure 41, trebles on beat 2 please add the D6 and E6 below the 7's; on beat 3 add a Bb6; on beat 4 add a C#6 and E6 below the 7's.
- If you have an F#2 and a C#2, please double the bass line from 51 to the third beat of 59.

Fantasy Number Four, by Michael Helman

- Tempo good as marked.
- Observe all accent marks carefully.
- All staccato notes *TD* (pages 4-6).
- Keep martellato technique light at all times.



Enthusiastic ringers representing six ensembles and one person who had never rung bells before gathered at the First Methodist church in Rutland, VT on Oct. 11 for the second annual **Vermont Skill Building Workshop**. The event was sponsored by Karen James and Bells of Joy. Jeannie Cushman lead activities to help ringers physically prepare to ring. Phil Brown and Karen James, clinicians, worked with ringers on developing accurate ringing strokes and note values, stopped techniques, and reading skills. This information was reinforced by a session of "putting it all together" at the end of the day. "Why can't we do this quarterly?" and "I learned so many things today" on ringer evaluation forms indicated a very positive experience for those attending.

Prelude on "Herzliebster Jesu"

by Fred Gramann

- Measure 1, add a short *fermata* to each half note.
- Measure 2, we will keep in tempo at about 66 to the quarter. Work for a very legato style through out the piece.
- Measure 6, back the moving 8ths down to a *mf*. Even though the melody is signified with accents, maintain a legato style without too much accent.
- Measure 12, please note that we are still at a *f* level, dim. as marked.
- Measure 17 and 20, do not accent the and of 2, keep it legato.
- Measures 46-58, please play the *Herzliester* Jesu melody on choir chimes; at 56 only the F5 and G5 on choir chimes (not the upper octaves); measure 57 the Eb5 and the D5 (play as a half note).
- Measures 64 through 75, bring out the Herzliebster Jesu line as much as possible while maintaining a legato style.
- Watch *rit.* In meas. 82, in measure 83 we will give each 16th note, place a *ten.* on beats 3 and 4.

Final Comments

Please take the time to work all music to the best of your ability before the festival. If possible it would be great for all groups to have performed each of the numbers prior to the festival. Do not assume that another group will pick up your slack—they may be thinking the same thing on the same tune. Any festival is only as good as the prior preparation of the registrants—your guest directors are not miracle workers, but will do everything they can with given resources to provide a good musical experience for all. We look forward to seeing you next June.



New Program for Tins Choirs

Tins Choirs will automatically be scheduled into Tins Mastery. Ringers who select tracks or other sequential classes are encouraged to attend all sessions; tracks and sequential classes are planned to move from topic to topic or skill to skill in a particular order. As you read the class descriptions, please note that your FC music will be used in many classes. Requirements for each class are included in the class description.

By designing their own schedule, ringers can:

- avoid any potential conflicts with massed or divisional rehearsals
- plan class sessions according to personal energy levels
- attend more than one offering of a class where it is taught by a different instructor
- participate in two different repertoire reading sessions in the same category
- focus on classes for individual and whole choir benefits
- enroll in tracks while still having ample opportunities to attend other classes.

All class selections should be a group/choir project. By carefully choosing your choir's classes, it will be possible to "share the wealth" after this Festival/ Conference by teaching one another the lessons you learn in individual class sessions. Classes and tracks are offered at appropriate levels in sessions which do not conflict with massed or divisional rehearsals. Registrants should choose classes or tracks to extend improve both their musicianship and ringing skills.

Sponsored/Endorsed Events: A Member Benefit

One of the best things we can give our Area I members in AGEHR is high quality events. Events can develop technical skill, musicality, director skill, repertoire knowledge, and can generate new memberships. Bringing our members together for performances and social events, as well as meetings with mentors helps fulfill our board's mission of *P.O.E.M.S.* (Performing, Organizing, Educating, Mentoring, and Socializing).

The board currently oversees and *sponsors* Areawide events that receive sponsorship from AGEHR: Festival/Conference, Directors' Seminar, Adult Ringer Weekend, High School Ring-Out, Family Handbell Camp (coming back for 2010!), draw ringers and directors from across New England and the Canadian Provinces.

Additionally, we *sponsor* state and regional Spring Rings, Skill-Building Workshops, Beginning Technique Workshops, Mini-Rings, Fall Festivals, and other events that bring together ringers and directors from smaller geographic areas. These events also receive the benefits of AGEHR sponsorship, and I hope reading a bit further will encourage you to think about creating new events, and getting them sponsored by AGEHR.

Does your church choir have wonderful teachers and ringers? Does your community choir want to reach out with an "educational" arm? These are instances where a "non-AGEHR" event could be **ENDORSED** by AGEHR. All of the same benefits are extended to endorsed events as are given to sponsored events, but an entity other than the Area I board would be running the event. According to the national Sponsored/Endorsed (S/E) policy, endorsed events are to pay Area I a per-registrant fee (ranging from \$0.75 - \$1.50 depending on the number of participants), but the Area I board waives this fee.

A way to think about the "to do it or not to do it"

dilemma is to ask yourself "what if?" "What if" someone was injured at your event? "What if" a box of bells that someone loaned to your repertoire reading was stolen? "What if" money went mysteriously missing? "What if" no one came to your event because they didn't know about it? If your church, for example, is hosting the event, how much do you know about the insurance policy held by your church? Does your community choir carry liability insurance?

This is not meant to be a scary article. Take a moment, however, to read the list of benefits for S/E, and realize that getting these benefits only costs an event organizer a few moments and only TWO pages of forms to fill out.

Liability Insurance

AGEHR Sponsored/Endorsed (S/E) events are covered by the National AGEHR umbrella liability policy. This policy generally conforms to the stipulations that venues such as hotels and resorts set for an event rental. The policy has a per-occurrence limit of \$1,000,000 and an additional aggregate limit of \$2,000,000. A separate Excess Liability Policy provides additional coverage of \$4,000,000 per occurrence.

Borrowed Equipment Insurance

Equipment borrowed for S/E events (NOT bells used for massed ringing, such as at a Spring Ring or FC) for classroom use, repertoire reading sessions, and other teaching is covered against theft or disaster under this umbrella insurance policy. There is a \$1000 deductible, and it is highly recommended that any equipment borrowed for an event be exactly recorded (for example – the number of octaves of bells, the brand, the estimated value of the equipment, and detailed information about the owner of the equipment).

Site Insurance

A venue that needs to be included as an additional insured on the AGEHR insurance certificate (a "named insured") can receive a certificate with this stipulate. AGEHR charges a \$35 fee for this service.

Employee/Volunteer Dishonesty Insurance

Individuals who handle money or other valuables for S/E events in an official capacity (for example, a treasurer or a bell captain) are covered by a national AGEHR insurance policy up to a limit of \$250,000. As with the borrowed equipment, appropriate documentation of cash and valuables "on hand" is necessary to insure complete coverage.

Performance Royalties

AGEHR will pay ASCAP performance royalties for music performed at S/E events. For this reason, the final report from sponsored events must include all titles performed, and final number of participants and audience numbers.

Mechanical Royalties

Audio recordings made of concerts performed during S/E events by event officials are permitted by the Handbell Industry Council. This agreement does NOT permit individual participants to record performances for broadcast (making, for example, video performances with cell phones and posting them to "YouTube") The S/E event is responsible for paying statutory mechanical royalties to each publisher, but this application grants the permission to record.

Mailing Labels

AGEHR will produce mailing labels for S/E events that can be mailed to the event planner, or emailed as an Excel file ready to be "mail-merged."

HOW-TO

Event planners fill out the application, and present a budget proposal (provided in the application packet); forward these two forms to the Area I Chair for approval or discussion, and the Chair forwards these forms to the national office. The event planner is informed via email when the final approval is given. If your event involves a recording, or you want to be sent mailing labels, there are a few more pages to fill out, but with minimal information.

If you are still reading this article, I thank you. It is my hope that you will consider planning ringing events in your area, and consider getting them Sponsored/Endorsed. 

Attending a handbell festival with your ensemble provides many opportunities for your group to grow.

By Stephen Buck Music Educator Training Seminar—In Review

school that was only ten miles from my home. I knew from the start that I would be teaching several sections of bells, a course in which I had no experience. Obviously, I had to learn quickly and become familiar with the resources for handbell teachers. Shortly after I joined AGEHR, I was made aware of a *(continued on next page)*

AGEHR's Music Educator Training Seminar took place at the Q Conference Center, outside Chicago, on September 13th, 2008. As a new handbells teacher, I will share some of the information I found particularly helpful at this seminar.

Starting in elementary classes, the educators were taken through several classroom activities presented by Griff Gall, the Area I Educational Liaison and Paul Weller, an elementary teacher from Minnesota. As Griff sang "John the Rabbit," he showed how to integrate handchimes during the vocal response at the kindergarten and first grade level. The expectations for ringing were simple (no need to damp), and the sustained nature of the chimes gives the students a foundation for pitch matching. In the older elementary classes, the handchimes can be used in place of, or in addition to, Orff instruments in song accompaniments. Other ideas for integration included movement, call and response, creating ostinati, and improvisation (rhythmic/ melodic). Included in the presentation were two excellent activities focused on improvisation and composition, utilizing the basic rhythmic "building blocks," which gave students a creative edge while focusing on two sometimes-forgotten national standards. As a teacher of primarily middle school students, I found that I could easily modify these activities for grades 6-8.

As a chorus teacher, I found Sandra Youmans' presentation of handbells and vocal music in the classroom quite helpful. Going beyond the idea of singing and ringing the chords to a given song, the handbells can be used for instrumental descants and a means of doubling the harmony/melody of a piece. She urged the educators to be creative and examine the accompaniment of a choral piece to decide how handbells can be integrated. One interesting tip I picked up in the presentation was for a chorus warm-up activity. Pass out the handchimes in the C scale to chorus members and have them take turns ringing the scale, and then ringing the pattern: do-re, do-mi, do-fa, and so on, in order to hear and understand the relationship between intervals.

There were many opportunities for audience participation at this seminar, including ringing, singing, making up accompaniments, and small group discussions. One of the discussion topics was about assessment of handbell programs, such as developing rubrics, setting goals and objectives in the classroom, and identifying assessment resources for handbells or handchimes. Linda Simms gave a presentation about adapting handbells and handchimes with the special needs population, and welcomed questions and comments from the educators at the seminar.

I have now been to my first AGEHR-sponsored event and I am glad to have had the opportunity to learn more about teaching handbells and meet others who are doing the same. As this was the first annual seminar, continuing interest and support is needed to keep this workshop alive for years to come. Any teacher or director would benefit from the ideas presented in integrating bells into the general music class, strategies in starting a bell program, and providing a firm musical foundation for beginning ringers.

There are numerous approaches and teaching skills with this special community. During the workshop, there will be two specific and different methods presented by the clinicians. Although the ringers do not read standard music notation, it is exciting to realize that they can make music using creative direction.

1. Director adapts the music, writing color coded letters on a scroll which correspond to the assigned colors on the bells and then points to the chart in desired rhythm. The director should have some basic knowledge of music notation and handbell ringing. Motivation and understanding of this special community is mandatory.

2. Director uses pointing, hand cues, and sign language. Depending on the complexity of the music and the size of the group, one or two directors may be needed. It is important to memorize the music to direct the ringers which are positioned in key board order. The director should have extensive music experience, some handbell knowledge, and a love for this special community.

Clinicians:

Cathy Taylor is director of the *Woodson Handbell Choir*, part of the specialized music program for developmentally disabled students in the Abilene, Texas school district. Cathy also directs the *Bell Peppers*, a new bell choir at DRI (Disability Resources Inc.—www.driabilene.org). DRI provides residential and vocational services for adults with developmental disabilities. The groups use a system of adaptive music notation on roll charts that utilize color-coded letters.

Cathy is the secretary of the Area IX board of the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers.

Sue Graves and **Joyce Klinck** are co-directors of the Joybells at Melmark, a caring community in Berwyn, Pennsylvania that provides residential, educational, therapeutic, and recreational services for children and adults with special needs. Under their joint direction, the handbell ringers, who do not read music, are both taught and directed by hand cues and sign language (www.melmark.org).

Sue is a music therapist and music teacher at Tempo! Music Therapy Services. Joyce currently serves on the Area II American Guild of English Handbell Ringers Board as the Special Group Liaison.
