Help us get to know all of our members.

Each month the Area I board receives an e-mail from Katie Schlegel (our amazing membership coordinator at the national AGEHR office in Ohio) that contains an updated list of members in Area I. On this list are around 400 names of church and community ensembles, directors and individual ringer members. When I look at this list, I am always curious to know how many ringers are represented by this list of 400 names. Some memberships may represent a small ensemble of seven ringers; another membership may represent several five-octave choirs each with thirteen ringers. Those 400 contacts we receive each month could easily translate to over 3,500 individual handbell ringers through out Area I.

When your Area I board meets, our goal is to plan events that meet the needs of *all* of our members. We take into account our directors *and* ringers: those who have been ringing for many years, and those who just picked up their first bell two weeks ago. AGEHR sponsored events are one of the most visible member benefits each of you receive. Events like the High School Ring Out, Adult Ringers Weekend, Directors' Seminar, Friends & Family Handbell Camp, Skill Building Workshops, and of course, Festival/Conference, are all Area I sponsored events run by our board or event chairs working with our board. Why attend Directors' Seminar? This year there are many reasons to attend the AGEHR Area I Director's Seminar starting with our guest clinician **Arnold Sherman**. Mr. Sherman is a prolific handbell composer as well as founder and Director of the *East Texas Handbell Ensemble*. In addition to Mr. Sherman, many clinicians from Area I will be leading workshops on

topics that include Copyright, Musicality through Movement, Handbells in Worship, Introduction to Conducting, Teaching the Basics, and Ringing to Reading: exploring rhythmic notation. In addition to these classes, there will be master classes in conducting, and three repertoire reading sessions.



Learning and sharing is not limited to the classes, as directors from around Area I have a chance to network with each other during the three meals shared together at the newly renovated Sheraton Framingham. Conveniently located just off the Mass. Pike in Framingham, the Sheraton has been a welcoming setting for Directors' Seminar

for the past two years.

Many of this year's sessions focus on the process of teaching new ringers and developing the skills of our intermediate ringers. This focus is the result of *(continued on page 4)*

Directors' Scholarships Available For Directors' Seminar

DEADLINE: December 31, 2009

The Area I Board has voted to make Directors' Scholarships available each year, rather than only during non-Festival/Conference years. In addition, the type and location of eligible events has been expanded. The Bradford Scholarships were established to honor Elizabeth Bradford by providing financial assistance to cover a portion of the cost of registration for educational events.

Under the approved guidelines, the Directors' Scholarships are offered yearly, with more funds available during non-Festival/Conference years. Scholarships may be used to help directors defray a portion of the registration costs for:

 Approved National educational events such as National Seminar, National Festival, International Symposium, and Master Classes. Approved Area I educational events, such as Area I Directors' Seminar and Area I Festival/ Conference.

ELIGIBILITY: To be eligible, a Director must be a member in good standing of Area I, Inc. An individual interested in becoming a director may be considered if recommended and sponsored by an Area I mentor.


Adult Ringers Weekend '10 Returning to the Mt. Washington Resort

The Adult Ringers Weekend '10 will be returning to the Mt. Washington Hotel and Resort by popular demand. The event is planned for November 5–6, 2010; so make your plans early.

ARW premiered in 2002, and is held in non-F/C years. Its purpose is to provide a unique ringing experience in a luxurious setting; one that provides a wonderful opportunity for ringers to relax and socialize, as well as ring. There are elements of ARW which make this unlike any other Area I event:

- ARW is held at the luxurious Mt. Washington Hotel and Resort in Bretton Woods, NH. One of a handful of Grand Hotels in the country, the Mt. Washington is noted for its history, exceptional cuisine, and breathtaking views of Mt. Washington.
- This event is designed for adults only; no need for chaperones!
- ARW is ideal for the individual ringer. Often choirs do attend and use this time as a community building event for their group. We just want you to know that while ARW is indeed an excellent setting for this, you should also be aware that you WILL NOT be ringing together. Bells are assigned by the registrar, with ringer input, and she makes it a point to

ensure that members of the same choir do not ring together. She is not being mean; one of the purposes of this event is to encourage you to meet ringers from all over Area I, and to learn from each other.



- There is no preparation expected or allowed prior to arrival. You will receive your music and bell assignment when you arrive. One of the goals of ARW is to have ringers experience just how far they can bring 3-4 pieces of music from sight reading to musical presentation within the period of $1\frac{1}{2}$ days, under the direction of a skilled clinician such as Nancy Cappel. There is no need for performance anxiety, however; we are all in the same boat upon arrival, and there is no closing concert, just an open rehearsal for the hotel guests to hear what we've accomplished.
- You are encouraged to bring a friend, spouse, or significant other. They can enjoy all the Resort amenities while you are on the ringing floor. The Hotel is like a cruise ship with a full



array of activities offered throughout the day.



Report from MAINE

Where in the world did summer go? Did we even have one? It does not seem possible that in two short months Christmas will be upon us!

Ringing in the Battery (G₄–C₆)

Thoughts from Festival/Conference

Those ringing between G₄ and C₆ will inevitably face the unique challenge of balancing melodic, harmonic and rhythmic elements, often at the same time. I recently offered suggestions and strategies to assist ringers in meeting those challenges, and offer them here.

Defining Elements: Many aspects of ringing parts that require melodic, harmonic and/or rhythmic components of the music simultaneously challenge elements of body strength and flexibility, and brain flexibility as well.

- The dominant hand is generally measurably stronger than the non-dominant hand, thus controlling the motion, tempo, and/or rhythm of the techniques required of the bell played in the non-dominant hand is often more challenging.
- Proprioceptive awareness, the knowledge of where parts of the body are and how they are moving, may not be well-developed, especially on the non-dominant side, making motor planning more challenging.
- Just as we have a dominant hand, we have a dominant side of the motor cortex of the brain, often resulting in some degree of difficulty shifting the focus from one side of the brain and body to the other. This is something that must be done in order to motor plan to perform one task with one hand and a different task with the other.
- Guess what? Just as we have hand and brain dominance, most of us also have eye dominance, which is usually the same side as hand dominance. In order to multi-task while ringing

in the battery, it is important to develop the ability to look ahead in order to prepare for the demands of the music. Eye dominance may impact your ability to literally look ahead.

• Difficulty hearing the melody separately from the rest of the music can make playing in the battery more chal-

lenging. Being able to hear how your notes fit into the different parts of the music can make it easier to be a part of the ensemble.



Issues: Given the above elements, issues that those in the battery face include:

- Performing two techniques at the same time while doing so musically: The challenge is to perform two different techniques smoothly with expected tempo, speed and dynamics. (How does one shake an accompanying whole note, for example, while ringing melody notes, keeping the shake smooth and melody notes in context?)
- Listening for two parts/patterns simultaneously: How do you know when you are playing the melody or the accompaniment, and then how do you ring so the melody is recognizable and in context? Can you hear how our notes fit into and enhance the melody and accompaniment?

Strategies to facilitate the ability to play opposing techniques at the same time, or different parts of the music, musically:

- Stretching and strengthening exercises to improve the balance of the musculature of dominant and non-dominant sides of the body. This balance can make it easier for you to sustain a shake, for example, while playing the melody with the other hand. Resources for these types of exercises are listed at the end of this article. Also approach your health care provider for specific exercises for your situation.
- Brain Flexibility Activities: Activities to facilitate more fluid shifting of motor activity and focus from one side of the brain to the other. (Similar to the principles and activities of Dalcroze).
- Effort Actions such as those of the Laban Movement Theory. This approach may facilitate

your ability to affect the weight, time or space of your ringing.

- Rhythm games can reinforce all of these elements and provides visual, sound and motor cues to meet the musical and motor demands of the music. Motor imitation games, the cup game etc.
- Decoding the Music: Analyzing the music before ringing can assist you in preparing for what is being asked and determining how best to do so:
 - ► What is the phrasing of the music; the form of the piece AB, ABC, etc.?
 - ► Where do rhythm, tempo, dynamic, key changes occur?
 - ▶ Where is the melody? When are you a part of the melody, part of the accompaniment, when do you play both? The melody is not always in the stem up part. (Use of a listening tape of the piece can be helpful in training your ear to hear your note in the melody and/or accompaniment. Ask your director to help define the melody for you if you still can't hear it.)
 - ► Is there a pattern to the accompaniment part that you play and/or the melody or submelody that can assist you in ringing more musically?
 - ▶ Is there a pattern to the techniques used in your part of the battery? Are you always ringing an accompanying shake while you are part of the melody, for example?

Use these strategies to address the issues arising in the battery:

- Various techniques against the shake, for example.
 - ► Improved muscle balance may assist in sustaining a smooth shake while performing another technique with the other hand.
 - ➤ Crossing midline exercises (Brain Gym, Dalcroze, motor imitation) may assist in the ability to perform the two techniques

- required, by increasing the ability to shift brain and motor focus from one side to the other.
- ► Using Effort Action terminology or visual cues may help reinforce movement requirements for each technique, or rhythm or dynamic demands of the piece of music.
- ► Rhythm games may increase the ability to meet the tempo requirements while performing two techniques simultaneously.
