- Pinnacle 2015 July 15-18, in Dallas, TX.



## REPORT FROM MAINE



Happy Fall to all Maine Handbell Musicians. I begin with an update on the 2016 Maine Spring Ring. A steering committee has been formed and held its first meeting in September. Several items received a consensus as follows:

- The event will be held in close proximity to central or midcoast Maine with easy access to 295 or 95.
- April 9, 2016 will be considered as the event date.
- The Maine Spring Ring will include vendors and workshops as well as the concert with massed ring.

Jean Veneziano and Jenifer Harrington will be working on site selection, Dan Evans will work on vendors, Laura and Joe Begenwald will serve as registrars, Amy Rollins will handle marketing, and Sue Evans will secure a conductor.

Additional tasks will need leadership as we get closer to the event. But once the site, date, and conductor are confirmed, we will be able to focus on other planning considerations. Early on, however, we will need input regarding workshops so we are hoping folks will step forward with ideas or will volunteer to offer a workshop.

The next meeting will be held on April 10, 2015, in Manchester and any Maine ringer is invited to attend. You can contact me for directions.

On another topic, the Area 1 Board of Directors met on September 20, 2014, in Rutland, VT. The topics that were addressed included plans for the 2015 June 25-28 Festival Conference to be held at the U. of MA at Amherst campus. It was noted that the fall workshops were designed to focus on the conference music. Also Brian Childers will be with us for the Director's Seminar in 2015, his first time coming to Area 1. Work has been proceeding on the Area 1 Job Descriptions including the State Chairs. It was announced that the Family Handbell Camp will be offered in the summer of 2016 during the last week in June, and will be held in the state of Maine.

And for your calendar: a traditional handbell event, "Ringing In The Season," will occur on Saturday, December 6 at 4:00 pm at Camden's First Congregational Church, UCC, 55 Elm Street, featuring Choral Bells, Joyful Bells, Penobscot Bay Ringers, Pine Tree Academy Bell Ringers, and handbell soloist Amy Rollins with Steve Weston on piano. Penobscot Bay Ringers will also play a handbell duet with hammered dulcimer soloist, Michelle Terry. A massed ring, directed by Sue Evans, Maine State Chair, Handbell Musicians of America, will conclude the program. Doors open 3:00 pm. Preshow piano music with Steve Weston at 3:30 pm. A free-will offering will benefit Coastal Opportunities, a non-profit that assists adults with developmental disabilities to become participating members in the social and economic community. And finally, I am happy to share this wonderful story about 4 devoted southern Maine handbell ringers. Written by Audrey Cabral, Handbell Director at First Parish Church in Saco, it reflects the powerful draw of handbell ringing, and profiles the qualities of those who ring with loyalty and devotion to this art.

Over 25 years ago, Stewart Shuster, the organist at First Parish Church in Saco, asked my brother, Ken-Jackman, if he would be interested in starting a bell choir there. Ken had been ringing for Stewart since he was 12 years old and Stewart knew that Ken had the musical and handbell knowledge, plus personality, to start a bell choir.

He "found" members of First Parish, who had musical knowledge but no experience ringing bells. They gathered 8 other ringers and began the journey that continues today. Many ringers have come and gone, and between Ken and me, we couldn't name them all. But these four - Lucy, Carol, Joyce, and Ron - have been and continue to be the foundation of the First Parish handbell ringers.

These four people have been the backbone of the group. Their attitude is always positive and they are supportive of all new ringers in the group. They always cheerfully help set up and tear down for rehearsals, as well as lug tables and bells up and down to the sanctuary as needed. When the choir started, it was Ron and Ken who built the tables that were used on the pews in the balcony of the church for ringing.

When Ken couldn't rehearse on weeknights because of his job, they were the ones who encouraged the ringers and convinced them that Friday nights and/or Saturday mornings were just fine for rehearsals. What else would they be doing?

When I took over for Ken, they helped me with everything I needed and are my biggest supporters and cheerleaders. These four still keep us all laughing, are honest when they don't like a piece, and are encouraging to everyone. Fun is the first word that comes to mind when we rehearse.

Ken and I couldn't be luckier, musically and personally, by having these people in our lives, as well as other ringers that have come and gone. They have meant and done more for

### Skill Building Workshops

Massachusetts was host to three of the four Area 1 sponsored Skill Building Workshops in Fall River on Oct. 18, in Chelmsford on Oct. 25, and in Southwick on Nov. 1.

### Almost 70 Attend Workshops and Holiday Rep Reading

The Bells of St. Matthew's and The Lincoln Ringers were pleased to sponsor a Holiday Rep Reading and Skill Building Workshop in Acton on Oct. 4 which was endorsed by the Handbell Musicians of America, Area 1.

Offering workshops in addition to the rep reading at this second annual early fall event proved to be a popular idea since attendance increased from last year by over 50%. Several members from the Merrimack Valley Ringers served as instructors for the 11 different courses ranging from handbell basics and stopped techniques to ensemble ringing and advanced weaving. The one issue that we had because of several last minute registrations was not guite enough equipment in some instances, a problem which the sponsors, the Bells of St. Matthew's and the Lincoln Ringers, have promised to address next year. Members from both choirs supplied refreshments throughout the day along with administrative assistance. The Rep Reading, directed by Diane Burke, reviewed several new holiday selections. Attendees were able to purchase the music presented at a 10% discount. St. Matthew's United Methodist Church in Acton provides a very comfortable and relaxed venue for this event. Plans have already started for next year's Workshop and Rep Reading in early October. 2015.

Registration for the 2015 Directors' Seminar, Friday-Saturday, February 6-7, will open on Tuesday, November 11.

We are thrilled to be able to bring Brian Childers to Area 1 to share his wisdom, humor, and insights with us. Brian is multiply talented, with conducting experience in school, church and community settings—and he's a composer, too! We hope you'll take advantage of the opportunity to learn from him and from all our clinicians.

For 2015 we're bringing back the meet-and-greet reception prior to Friday's dinner, which proved so popular last year. We're offering some new classes and new approaches to old topics. ### **Our Guest Clinician**

**Brian Childers**, an accomplished pianist, trumpeter, and composer, earned the Bachelor of Music degree in Piano Performance from Appalachian State University in 1993, and the Master of Divinity degree in Church Music from the M. Christopher White School of Divinity at Gardner-Webb University in 2003. He has served as Minister of Music at First Baptist Church (FBC) of Mount Holly, NC since 2001, where he directs five vocal choirs, five handbell choirs, and the church orchestra. With 100+ musical works published, Brian's choral, instrumental, and handbell compositions have been performed throughout the United States and abroad. - ... organizing and promoting local, statewide or Area 1 ringing events
- ... mentoring new choirs and ringers
- ... upholding the The Guild motto "Uniting people through a musical art."

### Is there someone special

you know who tirelessly promotes handbells and The Guild for Area 1? Is there a teacher or director who had the patience and took the extra time to get you and your handbell group up to speed? Just how much do they love and promote handbells? Area 1 wants to know about and reward them.

The level of some of our Area 1 talent rises above all others. And those are the people we will honor with the Area 1 Leadership Award, named for Margaret Shurcliff, who began the history of handbells in America right here in New England. Beginning with ten handbells and ringing with her children on Christmas 1926 at Beacon Hill in Boston then later inviting friends and their friends to her kitchen table to ring with other adults; arranging for others to get sets of bells and setting up massed rings; continuing with the formation of the New England Guild then expanding to the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers in 1954, Margaret worked tirelessly for over 30 years to promote handbells. Although we may not match Margaret's level of dedication again for some time, many individuals continue to work hard to make the art of handbell ringing easy and enjoyable.

The Award is modeled after the national Handebell Musicians of America Honorary Life Membership Award. The Board of Area 1 will present the Shurcliff Award at the 2015 Festival/Conference at the University of New Hampshire. But first, we need nominees. You may download a Nomination Form at Area 1's website: *www.agehrarea1.org/Shurcliff/*.

As defined in the procedure for the award, all nominations should be sent the The Guild's Area 1 secretary. Jean Degan, Area 1 Chair, has delegated an ad hoc, anonymous committee of three Area 1 members who will receive and evaluate all nominations for eligibility. This committee will present the qualifying nominations to the Board for vote. More than one award may be given in cases of tie votes, or none awarded if no nominees qualify or a majority of the Board vote is not carried.

Please download your Nomination Form, enlist friends and fellow ringers to help complete the form, and return to Area 1's secretary by the December 31 deadline. (*Note:* Form must be *received* by Dec. 31.)

#### **Eligibility Requirements**

Handbell Musicians of America Area 1 members to be considered for the Margaret Shurdiff Leadership Award, must have been a member of H andbell Musicians of America (also known as The Guild, formerly American Guild of English Handbell Ringers) Area 1, in good standing, for at least five continuous yearsprior to nomination. Persons not currently a member of Area 1 (for reasons of age, and/or retirement, or change of address out of Area 1) will be considered, as long as the five-year continuous prior membership requirement is met.



The Area 1 Chair preents the award recommendation(s) to the Board, who selects the final award recipient by popular vote In the case of tie votes, both or all nominess receiving the tie votes may be awarded the Shurdiff Leadership Award. If there is only one recommendation for voting, the Board must vote by

majority to select the award recipient. If the majority is not carried, no award will be presented.

The award, if any, will be presented at the Biennial Meeting, held during the next Area 1 Festival/ Conference

The more thoroughly you can reæarch the background of your nominæ, the better the Committæ will be able to judge the merits of his/her nomination. Although there are no particular requirements, documentation may include reæmes, testimonial letters of support, published works, etc. As appropriate, such material will be considered confidential.

For reasons of confidentiality, all documents submitted will be destroyed at the conclusion of the nomination process, so please send no original documents of any kind unless there are other copies in existence (e.g., resumes, curriculum vitae, etc.).
