NOTES FROM THE CHAIR...



It seems that the summer passes ever more quickly; one moment we are wrapping up the program year, and then, in the blink of an eye, September looms before us. I hope that you all have had some time for rest, recreation, and reflection, and that you are looking forward to the year to come.

This is my first message to you as Area 1's Chair, and I must admit that at the moment I feel rather like a duck: calm above the waterline, paddling madly underneath it! I look forward to building on the sturdy foundation laid by my predecessor, Sue Wilber, and to working with our excellent Area 1 Board, including new Board members Krishna Ersson (Chair Elect), Dan Moore (Secretary), and Cheryl Harger (Treasurer).

While we are entering into the "quiet" year of our two year cycle--that is, the year without a Festival/Conference--by no means does this mean a lack of activity. We begin on September 26 with a "Back to Bells" event, sponsored by our National office and hosted locally in every Area. This free workshop is designed specifically to help entities with unused or underused bell sets, whether current Guild members or not, put those sets back into service. In October we have another round of Project Education workshops. The High School Ring Out returns in November, while this year Directors' Seminar will be held at the end of January. In the spring we will have Spring Rings and Project Education ensemble ringing workshops.

And then, at the end of June, we re-launch the Area 1 Family Handbell Camp at Oceanwood Camp and Conference Center on the shore in Ocean Park, Maine. This event is a great opportunity for your family's ring-a-holics to satisfy those urges, while the non-ringers can swim, sun, and generally kick back at one of Maine's best beach vacation locations. And all at an affordable price; what could be better? (Oh, and yes--singles and couples are as welcome as families!)

Although it's almost two years away, planning has already begun for Festival/Conference 2017. We are not yet ready to announce a location or

REPORT FROM CONNECTICUT



We've had two wonderful chances to be together this spring—at the CT Spring Ring in May and at Conference Festival in June. As you know, the combined experiences of workshops and massed ringing, as well as the fellowship of handbell musicians, helps all of us grow in skills, confidence and musicality!

The day after Festival, June 29, a concert was held at Carnegie Hall, which was a joint project of Yale and Cambridge Universities. The work by Julian Revie, resident composer at the St. Thomas More Chapel at Yale, was written for chorus, orchestra, children's chorus and handbells all conducted by Maestro Stephen Layton from Cambridge.

Nearly 200 handbell ringers from around New England and New York City played from the highest balcony. Many of the ringers were from Connecticut. This world-premiere concert was the launch event for a major Yale-led initiative to provide sheet music and music education software online, all free to the world. Thanks to Rick Wood and Chime In! Music With a Mission for organizing the ringers who participated.

Connecticut had good representation at Conference Festival. Some of you dropped in at the State Chair breakfast on Saturday morning; and I enjoyed many casual conversations with others over the long weekend. A couple of issues came up in discussions:

*There appear to be churches/schools around with bells "in closets"—not being used at this time. We are trying to find out where these sad bells are and want to see if we can help get them ringing again. If you know of any places like this, please let us know

*I have talked with several fairly new directors, who are basically ringers drafted to lead a bell choir. They know how to ring, and obviously have leadership capabilities, but are feeling a bit uncertain about what is involved in planning a music program, and are perhaps looking for tips on conducting a bell choir. We have many experienced leaders around, and I will try to be helpful in connecting resources.

As always, I am updating my email list for better communications among handbell musicians in Connecticut. If you have not been getting emails periodically from me and would like to (or have been and would rather not), please let me know.

We have several community handbell groups in Connecticut, besides all the church handbell choirs. This fall I will be sending out information about concerts and events with handbells in our area, so PLEASE let me know anything of interest! One current note (!) of interest is that the Hockanum Valley Ringers are offering auditions for experienced ringers who might like to join them. They rehearse on Monday evenings in Vernon. Contact Director Lawrence Berdensey at 860-375-0333 by August 24 for more information.

Meanwhile, enjoy the rest of the summer. I can think of a lot of summer activities to keep those ringing muscles in shape!

Altogether, there were 22 ringers in attendance from Maine and there were five ringers who were willing to get up for a 7:00 am meeting to attend the state breakfasts. Although there were but a few of us, those of us who met in that early time slot, including: Sally Adair, Ray Cornils, Amy Rollins, Gail Kelly and myself, had a productive opportunity to talk about ringing in Maine.



The selection of pieces will be sent out in September, with the goal that you will have ample time to purchase and prepare the music. Please let me know if you have any ideas for workshops or vendors that you would like to see in attendance.

More news from Maine –Amy Rollins reports that after a five-week hiatus, Penobscot Bay Ringers reconvened on July 9 to prepare music for two fall concerts which will be held in Camden and Belfast on Saturday, Octo-

REPORT FROM MASSACHUSETTS



Just as these late summer flowers bask in the warm sun, so do I smile with all the handbell news coming in from around the Commonwealth of Massachusetts! We are so fortunate to have positive momentum building in our musical world. Read on with excitement and anticipation of a glorious fall. These contributors have taken the time and effort to share news of general information with you. Feel free to contact any of these groups with your comments or questions!

FROM ABBY SCHOPPE, FAITH LUTHERAN CHURCH, ANDOVER, MA

As we gear up for the fall season, it's exciting to see how the bell and chime programs at Faith Lutheran Church in Andover, MA have grown! Faith started its bell choir about 10 years ago with 2 octaves of bells. We currently have 4 octaves and are in the midst of raising money for a fifth. We're also in the unusual and enviable position of having more congregation members who would like to ring than we have room for in a typical 4-octave setup, so we cycle through interested people, using different ringers for different portions of the year. The bell choir typically plays music at Levels 2 and 3; we play in worship once a month, we participate in the Massachusetts Spring Ring each year, and this year, two of us attended Festival Conference. Four years ago, Faith also started a children's handchime group for Grades 2-8. Because that group has grown so much, this year we will have TWO children's groups! Children's Chimes will be open to kids in Grades 1-5; no musical experience is necessary for participation in this group, and in addition to preparing to play in church once a month, these kids will learn the fundamentals of reading music and of healthy ringing. Meanwhile, the new Junior Bell Choir will be for kids in Grades 6-8 who have at least minimal experience playing chimes, bells, or any other instrument. Because dividing into two groups means we will have room for a few more ringers, I want to encourage any interested kids in the Merrimack Valley (or beyond) to come ring with us, regardless of religious background or affiliation. If you know of an interested child, please contact me (Abby Schoppe, the director).

I have to say that both the blessing and the curse of the program at Faith is that I try to get everyone involved even if they have zero musical background. So the fact that we are constantly adding new ringers who don't really read music is tough because it really holds the bell choir back; there are a few quite experienced ringers in the group who could easily be performing at a much higher level if we weren't being slowed down by all the newbies. But in the very long term, having all these interested ringers will be great for the future of the bell program at Faith and for the future of the handbell world in general! Anyway, with the second

kids' ensemble starting, we are definitely going to need to pick up a few more kids to keep both ensembles reasonably full, so hopefully this paragraph will accomplish my goal of flushing out some more interested kids in the area!

FROM LYNN MASSON, THIRD ANNUAL HOLIDAY REP READING / FALL WORKSHOPS

He has served on the Board of Directors of Handbell Musicians of America, Area 1, in many positions including Member at Large, Area Chair, Area Representative to the National Board of Directors. He has served Area and National handbell events as organizer, clinician and massed and division conductor. For 20 years he was responsible for the youth and adult handbell program at the Tewksbury Congregational Church, Tewksbury, MA, and for the last 13 years has been directing New England Ringers, a bronze level community handbell choir. Ed is a retired electrical engineer who spent his entire career managing customer support operations for various companies supporting the high tech industries.

Daniel K. Moore retired from teaching and directing the Concert Handbell Ringers of the Wheeler School (Providence, RI) after 37 years. His auditioned ensembles appeared frequently on television, performed opening concerts at national and regional handbell festivals, recorded with the Empire Brass, Ed Sweeney, and on several solo CD's! audiences DIDN'T know: due to a perfect storm of illtimed and unpredictable injuries, all but one of our concerts had one or two ringers SIGHT-READING, to fill in for a ringer unable to play at the last minute! It was both terrifying and exhilarating...which ultimately played right into our tour title! We took on each concert

MVR had two weeks off "to recover" before trekking out to Festival Conference 2015 at UMass Amherst. Despite two still-recuperating ringers (and one whose injury developed right before the final concert), the group tackled the long weekend with flying colors – attending rehearsals and classes, teaching and performing, and making sure the mood was merry. It was a fabulous end for a noteworthy season. And we've jokingly decided the next CD we record will be called "The Show Must Go On."

Rehearsals pick back up in September, and we've already got sizeable Winter AND Spring tours in the works! Many exciting prospects. MVR will be busy...but until then, we're taking some much deserved R&R and putting our feet up. Happy Summer!!!

In July 2016, hundreds of handbell musicians from around the world will travel to beautiful Vancouver, Canada for the 17th International Handbell Symposium. We want you to be among them!

OUR LOCATION Vancouver is one of the world's most beautiful cities and a prime tourist destination for people the world over. It is superbly situated for travel from Pacific Rim countries as well as easily accessible to all North American ringers. British Columbia also has strong ties to its British and European forebears. We look forward to welcoming handbell musicians from all around the world to this "Jewel on the Pacific" that has so much to offer.

Our venue is the Vancouver Convention Centre. Surrounded by the mountains and located on the waterfront at Canada Place in the heart of beautiful downtown Vancouver, the VCC (www.vancouverconventioncentre.com) is an award-winning facility. It opened in July 1987 after originally serving as the Canada Pavilion at Expo '86. Since its inception, the facility has demonstrated a constant commitment to service excellence, technical capabilities, and creative, high-quality banqueting.



OUR THEME Canada's rich aboriginal history and culture, combined with Vancouver's reputation for leadership in sustainability and environmentalism, has provided the ideal focus for this event. Honouring the ancestors of this land, including the aboriginal ways of knowing and being within an environment, has encouraged us to explore the many complementary ways that First Peoples cultures and environmental sustainability intertwine and connect within

community. We plan on a high level of involvement of Canada's First Peoples and integration of Canadian aboriginal history and culture throughout the event. We look forward to other nations sharing the sounds of their lands and lives of their peoples at IHS2016.

Our title, "Soundings," has many faceted, rich associations. The musical association is clear, but the word also evokes thoughts of depth, fullness, resonance (all of which relate nicely to the handbell idiom), as well as observations of the environment and/or water. It evokes the Aboriginal peoples' connection to the natural world, as well as connecting to meaningful ideas in terms of musical depth and the fullness of musical sound of many ringers playing together—a sense of world community. Its relevance to both music and envi-



ronment gives a great deal of scope for composition and will come into play in many other ways during the event as well.

OUR LOGO Coast Salish artist Chris Paul designed the SOUNDINGS logo. It is rich in imagery and captures so well the many facets of our theme: music, community, the environment. Blue for water and sky, the bell and its reflection representing earth and sea, musical sound and echo (reverberation), the present and our history. The eagle — a symbol of grace,

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power and great intellect (all important for handbell ringers!) — enwraps the bell, as the handbell community reaches around the globe. And in one further image emphasizing "community", the upper eagle shares the 'clapper' of the bell with its reflection.

THE IHS ROTATION Since 1984, the location of the International

Handbell Symposium has rotated among the six members of the International Handbell Committee (America, Japan, Great Britain, Korea, Canada, Australasia). In 2010, Hong Kong was admitted to membership in the IHC; its place in the rotation will be added at the end of the current cycle. Other countries are requesting admission to the IHC so it may be at least 2022 before the IHS is again on North American soil and so easy to get to. You don't want to miss this opportunity! For 2016 we extend a particular invitation to handbell musicians from many other countries not represented by a national guild—all are welcome!

ON-LINE In keeping with the focus on environmental stewardship, our aim is to make this event as "Green" as possible.
