Next, let's talk about some of the exciting events going on in the handbell world this year and beyond. First, our local Area events: All of our state Spring Rings have now wrapped up! The Spring Rings are some of the longest-running events in the area. Vermont has been going strong for 35 years, and Massachusetts just honored the event founders, Karen Leonard and Ed Henderson, as they celebrated the event's 30th anniversary. The Spring Rings provide a great way to experience many of the joys of our big Festival/Conference on a smaller, local scale but with the same quality of clinicians that you have come to expect in Area 1. And speaking of Festival/Conference, Sue Wilber and her team have been hard at work planning F/C 2017. We already announced that we will be returning to UMASS Amherst next year from June 29 to July 2, 2017. Please also look later in this issue for the final list of repertoire so you can start preparing! To help with learning the F/C rep, we will be offering skill-building workshops this fall for ringers and directors to read through and woodshed the music with our expert Area 1 clinicians.

Now, for those of you who simply can't get enough bells here in our area, we've got two big events happening this summer. The first is our <u>National Seminar</u> and it's happening right here in the Northeast in Rochester, NY. It's an amazing way to get re-energized about bells. You will find all the "big names" in bells in attendance, either performing showcase concerts or teaching amazing classes. Area 1's own Karen Leonard and Dan Moore will be teaching classes, and Boston's Back Bay Ringers will be performing! Come join me and other Area 1

leaders and members in Rochester! Finally, as if a nearby National Seminar wasn't enough, how about an international event? The 17th International Handbell Symposium will be held in Vancouver, Canada this July 26-30. I attended the 15th Symposium in Liverpool in 2012 and it was incredible to see all the different ways handbells are used across the world.

I'd like to also take a moment here to describe some of my goals for the Area. Former Chair Jean Degan and I led a great discussion at the Winter Workshop in January entitled "What Can Area 1 do for you?" From this conversation as well as many other excellent chats I've had with many of you at other events, my mission for the next 18 months will be to:

- * Support our current leaders and grow new ones by asking the State Chairs, Community Choirs, Church Music Directors, and other community leaders to reach out to their communities to start conversations.
- * Revitalize and rethink our online presence via our Area 1 website, Fundamental Tone periodical, and Facebook page with the most up-to-date information (e.g. concerts, workshops, spotlights, articles), membership benefits (e.g. scholarships and equipment loaner programs), and resources for event organizers and potential Area leaders (e.g. press-kits, workshop material).
- * Improve communication both within the Board as well as to our membership by consolidating, unifying, and documenting the tools we use.

The Board had a great meeting earlier this month and we have come up with a number of concrete actions to begin making progress to achieving these goals. One notable action is the definition of a new position, Communications Director, who will manage the way we reach out to our membership, including, but not limited to, our website, periodicals, and social media. This person will work closely with other Board members and Area leaders, such as our webmaster, newsletter editor, and state chairs to ensure that you, the membership, have timely and accurate information about Area 1 events and services, and that we, your elected and appointed officials, are providing the most relevant and desirable events and services to our Area.

We're off to a great start this year and we have much more in store for 2016. I am very much looking forward to working with all of you in the coming months. I am proud to be serving in one of the most respected Areas in the Guild, "where it all began!" Congratulations to all those who helped put on successful events this spring, and good luck to those who are finishing up spring programs and concerts. Have a fun-filled summer everyone!

REPORT FROM VERMONT

The handbell ringers in Vermont have come through a very snowless winter punctuated with joyful Holiday concerts, mini-rings, playing for church services and for community gatherings and now the daffodils are blooming and the warblers are singing.

A Spring Ring Repertoire Workshop was presented for ringers and directors on February 6, 2016 at West Lebanon Congregational Church. The trio of Phil Brown, Karen James and Jeri Bergdahl spent time analyzing and rehearsing the spring ring repertoire. After lunch, the participants spent time reading new repertoire.

But the culmination of the year is always the Spring Ring. The VT Handbell Association sponsored a Director's Workshop on the evening before Spring Ring. It was held at St Bridgets Catholic Church from 6 to 9 p.m. After a yummy dinner and a chance to network, Michael Joy led a workshop titled *How Does it Feel?* about bringing rhythmic feeling to performances. He had the 20 directors present dancing around the room to various rhythms he played off his MP3.

The next morning at 8 a.m. load-in began for Marble Valley Rings at West Rutland High School. The over 200 ringers represented 24 choirs, 4 states as well as

Ontario and Quebec provinces in Canada.
Our clinician Michael Joy led 4 sessions of massed rehearsals of our 4 massed pieces including his own powerful composition,

Appassionata. In between our rehearsals there was the opportunity for the participants to choose 2 workshops. To accommodate all the ringers, there were 17 workshop offerings with the most popular being Michael's Bell Ringing and Tai Chi and the 2 African drums sessions.

After the long day, our final break featured a huge cake, donated by the Tinmouth Community bell choir and celebrating the 35th anniversary of the VT Spring Ring. Then it was time for the concert. A near capacity audience enjoyed the massed pieces interspersed with solo pieces by 8 individual choirs and a mesmerizing bell tree solo by Karen James. All in all, it was a very JOYful day.

The Vermont Handbell Association is now hard at work on the plans for Spring Ring 2017 which will be held in the Newport area with clinician Stephanie Wiltse. The directors from around the state will gather in July to choose the repertoire, workshop offerings and also the fall workshop schedule.

This was one request I had received from directors in Connecticut, and they were glad of the chance to share ideas. The afternoon concert gave the massed ringers a chance to show what they had learned with the three selections. Three of the choirs also shared a selection of their own: Concert Bell Choir from St. Luke in Gales Ferry, Bells of Fire from Norwich, and Victory Chimes from our host church.

REPORT FROM MAINE

Happy Spring to all Maine ringers and directors. I am delighted to write about the Maine Spring Ring 16which took place at Winthrop High School on April 9. Just a short month ago, this event attracted 124 registrants representing 14 bell choirs who rehearsed in the massed ring format together, and in Tins and Coppers divisions. Between rehearsals, 5 workshops were offered, a handbell store could be visited and time could be found to meet and greet friends in the Maine handbell world. Over 130 folks attended the concert at the end of the day. All expenses were paid with a net profit of \$270.00.

Our first foray into online registration using Constant Contact provided a learning curve for our committee and in particular our registrars, Joe and Laura Begenwald. However, they both are excited to jump on board for the next Spring Ring in 2018, feeling confident they now know what to expect. The online process also netted us with 40 additional names and contact info to add to the 81 that we currently have. Surprisingly, only two choirs and two individuals used the paper registration forms we provided, giving us the confidence to continue to use online registration.

As choirs arrived on the morning of the event, the directors were handed a packet which included the floor layout, programs for all ringers, and lanyards with printed inserts identifying the name of each participant. Since the number of lanyards available for borrowing from Area 1, was less than we needed, we purchased our own 150 lanyards, which were returned after the concert for use in our next Spring Ring. Logo pencils were a nice surprise in each choir's packet and once the tables were set up in their assigned location, the continental breakfast was an especially welcomed treat for so many choirs who left for the site very early in the morning.

A popular offering for the ringers and directors was the Raleigh Ringers store. Tie dyed gloves, shirts, CD's, bags, videos, and books were sold for a profit of \$161. We also offered a music swap and sale items table. One choir was selling their G3 bell and it was purchased by our guest conductor.

It was indeed an additional pleasure to have as our guests the Lincoln Middle School Handbell Choir from the Portland Public Schools. They performed a solo, *Theme From The Muppets* and were very well received as our only youth choir.

The Maine Spring Ring 16 committee held a dinner meeting to review all aspects of the event, noting what went well and what might require a second look. Each committee member offered the comments made by their choirs. Some very nice remarks were appreciated

which indicated an overall sense that the event was "well planned," "beautifully executed," and inspiring in the sense that individuals are now sharing what they learned in workshops, and planning fundraisers to save up for the purchase of chimes. Our guest conductor, Peter Coulombe, made everyone feel comfortable and full of joy. Suggestions for future workshops included: bell repairs/adjustment and a be-

The committee acknowledged some areas that should be addressed by the next committee. The following sample list recognizes some of those suggestions:

- Assign hosts for each workshop with water for workshop leaders
- Increase number of people at registration desk on the day of the event
- Add to Constant Contact questions: "How group should be listed in the program.
- Monitor Entrance and Exit doors for the concert
- Send posters for display to choirs sooner
- Survey all participants

 Make a special effort to engage choirs from south of Portland as well as those who did not attend in 2016.

Finally, the Kennebec Journal did a fantastic story about the Maine Spring Ring 16 with beautiful color photos taken during rehearsals and workshops. The article appeared on the front page.

The next Maine Spring Ring will be held on April 7, 2018 in the Brunswick, Maine area. The committee for the 2018 Spring Ring has yet to be formed and we are hoping that some folks will offer to help out. We already have our registrars, marketing coordinator, and vendor coordinator. If you have an interest in working on any of the following areas: floor layout, repertoire, workshops, food,etc, or in serving as a co-chair, please contact me at me.area1@handbellmusicians.org.

I want to thank all the members of the committee for the work done to put this event together: Ray Cornils, Amy Rollins, Laura Begenwald, Joe Begenwald, Jean Veneziano, Gail Kelly, Dan Evans, and my Co-chair Jenifer Harrington.



Area restrictions are not necessary. A volunteer will decide if he/she wishes to accept an invitation to sub at another choir. A ringer in Nashua obviously won't answer a request from Truro, but someone else just might.

MASSACHUSETTS SPRING RING CELEBRATES 30 YEARS

We all know that handbells in the US began right here in Boston in the early 1900's when Margaret Shurcliff received a set of English handbells and started a choir on Beacon Hill. This grew into the New England Guild of English Handbell Ringers which grew into the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers, now Handbell Musicians of America.

Now we enjoy constant workshops, clinics, concerts, and massed ringing events where ringers can improve their skills and share their ringing experience. Most of these events depend on volunteer directors, organizers, and instructors.

Both Karen Leonard and Ed Henderson have each been leaders in the handbell world for over 4 decades expanding



this vision. They've directed multiple choirs, lead workshops and skill building sessions, and continually share their expertise to inspire the growth and expansion of the art of handbell ringing. 30 years ago they organized the first MA Spring Ring, called the Chelmsford Handbell Festival bringing together 4 choirs to share a mass ringing concert. They have organized the event ever since as the name changed to

Merrimack Valley English Handbell Festival, then to MA Spring Ring, and it has grown to involve almost 20 choirs representing over 200 ringers.

In celebration of the MSR 30 year anniversary Karen and Ed will share the podium as our guest clinicians. The repertoire is some of the favorite pieces from the past 30-years, and will include a brass ensemble, flutist, and bell trees to augment the pieces. squares were made first and inspired us to complete this project. We are currently in the process of putting the pieces together and hope to be able to present them to our congregation when we play in church in May.

Also, to help with the expense of this project, the church is sponsoring a homemade candy sale with all proceeds to go to the bell choir. We are expecting several hundred dollars from this sale.

group supplies a description and history of the group, the program and a picture, this information can often be placed in the local newspapers. Sending a flyer (either jpeg or pdf) to the neighboring churches is helpful, especially if they are willing to include it in their weekly communication with their parishioners. Putting flyers in local coffee shops and grocery stores, putting a sandwich board in front of the church reguires only a moderate amount of effort. The day of the concert, the sanctuary or performance hall needs to be accessible several hours in advance of a concert for set up and rehearsal. A church representative should be on hand to help with logistics, etc. An additional room needs to be available for the group to gather, rest and refocus as the audience gathers. Having water available for this break is a kindness appreciated. A reception following the program allows the performing group members to meet the public and vice versa. It is a good opportunity for the church's ringers to meet the group.

If you haven't yet had an outside group play in your church, you should consider the benefits it will have on your congregation, on your ringers, and on you, the director. The impact is hard to quantify, but it is significant. There is so much to learn from each other, so much fun to be had!





Those accompanying adults who do not meet the eligibility requirements to register as an IHS2016 Session Chaperone (details below) are welcome to register as a Chaperone Accompa**nying Delegate(s)** and will be responsible for chaperoning only those youth delegates with which they are associated. Those who meet the IHS2016 Session Chaperone eligibility requirements (details below) may register as either chaperone type.

IHS2016 Session Chaperones (those who will be supervising SOUND EFFECTS activities on behalf of the IHS2016 Planning Committee) will be tasked with the supervision of assigned delegates, which will include being responsible for holding and maintaining their assigned delegates' medical and emergency contact information. IHS2016 Session Chaperones are not required to be affiliated with an attending Youth Track delegate, however, in order to ensure the reliability of our chaperones, applicants for the IHS2016 Session Chaperone position must be Canadian citizens, at least 21 years of age on July 26, 2016, and willing to provide a Police Information Check.

Please note: all chaperones are required to pay the Chaperone registration fee which provides access to all Youth Track sessions, meals, performances, and cultural events.
