# NOTES FROM MASSACHUSETTS

Greeting from your new MA state chair.

My name is Susan (Sue) Lee and I am Director of Handbell Ministries at St. Matthew's United Methodist Church in Acton. I direct two regularly scheduled choirs, one with 14 ringers and a small ensemble of six or less, and frequently mix and match or pull in "used to ring" members to ring for special occasions.

I was a music educator for 26 years, and retired after 13 years as a classroom teacher. It was a wonderful career. I started ringing in the 1970s, and eventually directed three vocal and two handbell choirs at a previous church. I became more involved with the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers, now Handbell Musicians of America, when I got involved in the music program at St. Matthew's, and organized a hand chime choir. Once we borrowed "real bells" to ring at Christmas time, my ringers were hooked and we began our fundraising. It was 19 years ago that our three octaves of handbells and hand chimes arrived. We now have five octaves of handbells and five and a half octaves of chimes.

Now I am eager to get to know as many handbell groups across the state as I can. I would love to hear from you with a short bio about yourself, how you got into ringing or directing, and what you love about handbell ringing / directing.

Enjoy the remainder of this wonderful summer!



If you didn't attend, be assured that future event organizers would like to know why. Was it the cost, distance, dates, music, directors....or something else that discouraged you (and your ringing friends) from participating? The Klapper

Kat asks that you give this some thought and convey your thought and ideas to any Area 1 Board member, and especially to the Chair of the next Area 1 Festival Conference, Krishna Ersson

On to this edition's question:

Dear Klapper Kat:

Our handbells and chimes are now nine years old and some of them just don't sound good or work well any more. Some of them feel loose, some stick, and my ringers are complaining that they don't ring easily (or at all!). Our chimes are awful! I know that my manufacturer offers a refurbishing service (and that takes a long time and costs a lot of money), but is there any alternative?

Signed: Massive Maintenance Misery Maestro,

#### Dear Massive Maintenance Misery Maestro:

Please, please don't despair or panic; you do have many options: please consider the following:

Both major domestic manufacturers provide thorough and comprehensive refurbishing programs. The question of whether or not your set(s) need that much work depends on your regular maintenance schedule, the age and condition of the set and any issues which seem to reoccur. In my experience, a complete factory/manufacturer refurbishment is a good idea every seven to twelve years depending on how often your instrument is played, the environment in which your bells are used and stored ( if you live near the ocean, the salty atmosphere can take a toll). Notice that I underscored factory/manufacturer refurbishment. Beware! Having work performed on your bells by a non-authorized company or repair service will jeopardize or void your factory warranty. No matter what they claim, be certain that such vendors/ repair facilities provide you with proper documentation to prove that they are authorized to provide the services you need.

Often, you can save time and money by contacting a local factory representative, or the factory itself. Do this first! Then, consult the manufacturer's website for more information as necessary. Those sites are generally helpful in offering guidance about maintenance and refurbishing procedures.

The Klapper Kat strongly recommends that you, or one of your ringers attend a Maintenance Workshop frequently offered at Area 1 events. Armed with the information from such a workshop, and a few simple tools, you'll find that the routine adjustments and troubleshooting of your bells and chimes are really pretty easy. Tool kits are available from larger handbell accessory vendors or local hardware stores, and replacement parts such as restraining springs and handles are available from your local representative or the factory.

Finally, have your newly designated repair guru perform bi-monthly check-ups on main assembly and handle screws, and restraining springs. Have your ringers wipe down their instruments after each rehearsal!
