



THE KLAPPER KAFÉ



Dear Klapper Kat:

I direct two handbell choirs, one very novice, and one intermediate. Both choirs are registered for the Festival Conference, and we're fortunate to be able to borrow an extra set of bells. We've never participated in massed ringing before and most of my ringers - especially the least experienced ones - are very apprehensive about being prepared. How do I calm them down to that they can prepare adequately, and have the best possible experience? Signed: Help me, please.

Dear Help me, please:

Attending an Area Festival Conference - especially in Area 1- should be a joyful, educational, and uplifting experience for you and your ringers. Here are some things you can share and do with your ringers as you *all* prepare:

First, assure your ringers that they will not be the only 'new' kids on the block. There will be many ringers for whom this is their first encounter with a Festival and massed ringing. You and your ringers will be made to feel welcome and encouraged to seek out members of the Festival Conference Committee, or previous attendees to ask questions. You'll feel like you have over five-hundred 'instant' friends! Ask for a 'First Time Attendee' ribbons for your name badges and wear them proudly.

Since you are already registered, the Klapper Ket assumes you have made your class selections. Encourage your ringers to gather class notes and share what they have learned with each other. The more classes your groups cover, the more valuable information and experiences they can bring home to benefit the entire ensemble. Each morning, there will be a list of classes which have openings; if a ringer wants to modify their chosen schedule, that is the time do it. Information on that process will be available when you arrive. When you get home, use part of a rehearsal as a sharing session.

When it comes to actual massed ringing rehearsals, preparation is the not-so-secret ingredient for success. Your ringers should come knowing their music. The massed directors' task is not to teach you how a piece goes, but to encourage you (and everyone in your ringing division) to play the piece with your musical best foot forward. Watching the directors is critical; in a large area, ringers cannot rely on what they hear, but rather on what they see - and that should be the director. Logistically, many choirs are quite a distance from the podium, and watching the director often (once a measure is not too much!) is what keeps five or six hundred ringers together. And of course, they can only watch if they know their music! If you need guidance with your musical preparations, study the published rehearsal notes, seek out an experienced director in your area to help, and/or contact your Area 1 State chairperson. They'll be glad to help.

At some point, your ringers must understand the scope of the experience they are having. Encourage them to individually go sit in the audience's seats for a few minutes and watch and hear this remarkable spectacle.

They will be amazed!



PREPARING FOR FC: BEYOND THE MUSIC...

Several directors were asked "If you had words of wisdom to impart to those attending Festival Conference what would they be?"

Amazingly, there were responses! "Thank you" to Dan Moore, Larry Berdensey and Jane Nolan who offered pragmatic and practical suggestions to help us prepare for Festival Conference...Beyond the Music.

"Go with an open mind remembering that this art form is still in it's infancy; everything about handbell ringing is still evolving - even the instrument(s). In conversations and classes, take away what works for you. Compare it to other perspectives that you have experienced. No single instructor or event can provide all the answers."- Dan Moore

Larry contributed the following suggestions:

Festival conference is a wonderful event that allows musicians, of all levels, the opportunity to become totally immersed in a truly unique and exciting handbell experience. Massed ringing, participating in classes, and socializing are three main components of festival conference; however, what one does leading up to conference time is equally important. Standing and ringing for long periods of time (1 1/2-2 hrs.), along with walking to and from classes, places many physical demands on our bodies. Like athletes preparing for an event, handbell musicians must also prepare by building endurance for this handbell extravaganza. If you do not exercise on regular basis, now is a good time to start a conditioning routine to help you prepare for conference time. Listed below are some suggestions in preparing for festival conference. As always, it is important to consult with a medical professional before engaging in any type of physical activity or diet plan.

- Stay hydrated:—Water is an essential part of our daily diets. Each of us is unique, and our daily intake of water will depend upon our daily activities, weight, health, etc. Hydration should happen daily and just not when you are engaged in a physical activity. Consult your doctor for the proper amount of water to drink on a daily basis.
- Now is the time to engage in daily exercise: If you do not exercise regularly, it is important to implement daily stretches and start a daily walking routine. If you are feeling really ambitious, join a gym—it can only help in the long run!
- Healthy diet: Eat healthier meals and have healthy snacks while attending festival. UMass offers quite an array of culinary experiences. It is ok to splurge now and then; however, be smart in your choices.
- Unpacking/Packing: It is important to avoid any type of strain to your body. This includes unpacking and packing your vehicle, and
 moving cases, tables and other equipment. When lifting objects, remember to bend your knees and use your legs—not your
 lower back.
- Socialize and have fun: Meet new people through activities that are associated with festival: daily raffles, forming an ice cream social, attending mini-concerts, and going to church.

And last, but certainly not least, Jane offered the following tips:

Among things other than music, people should bring:

- comfortable shoes.
- their special pillow,
- a fan if they are not in air conditioning,
- band aids or tape for hand and finger protection with hours of ringing,
- bottled water.
- rubber mats to stand on on the ringing floor,
- a bag or backpack to carry things in for rehearsals and classes,

in addition to binders, gloves, choir shirt for final concert......

People don't need to feel they have to start packing now, but they could start putting things aside.

So there you have it - sage advice and practical suggestions to make Festival Conference a very rewarding experience -
